FINANCES and MARKETS

[Republican A. P. Leased Wire] NEW YORK, Nov. 22. (Wall Street) Dealings in stocks today marked the low ebb of any regular session for several months. Sales amounted to only \$22,000,000, one third of the total turnover occurring in the first hour.

Domestic politics was a factor. The Balkan situation was considered from various angles. Metal shares offered the chief diversion of the day, that group manifesting further strength on the 20 cent quotation for copper. Guggenheim exploration rose 1 1/2 to the new record of 79 1/2. Petroleum was substantially higher for the same reason, various producing companies advancing prices of crude and refined oils. Texas Company rose 4 1/2 to the new record of 204 1/2 and associated oil, in which the Southern Pacific company has large stockholdings, rose 1/2 to 68 1/2. Motor shares and the recognized war issues were 2 to 5 points higher at their best. American Locomotive common and preferred advanced upward by reports of additional large contracts. United States steel was sluggish and Bethlehem steel was not quoted at all. Rails were backward throughout, with sudden weakness in New Haven toward the close, the stock falling 3/4 to 87.

Baltimore and Ohio for October reported a net gain of \$1,202. Texas and Lehigh Valley yielded its net by \$116,000.

The only usual feature of the firm bond market was a transfer of \$1,000,000 United States registered 2 per cent bonds in one lot at 93 1/2, against a previous quotation of 92 1/2. Total sales (par value aggregated) \$5,275,000.

United States registered 4 1/2 were 3/4 per cent lower on call.

At the end of the session, the fact was plain that speculative shortsellers of wheat had been over enthusiastic throughout the greater part of the day. Corn swayed with wheat. Oats held within narrow limits.

Most of the options in the provisions market scored a decided advance. The main reason was that the week's average weight of hog arrivals here was the lightest on record.
