

the work or improvement to be of more than local or ordinary public benefit and that the costs and expenses of said work shall be assessed upon a certain district and providing that the proposed work or improvement shall be done under the provisions of Title VII, Chapter XIII, Revised Statutes of Arizona, 1913, Civil Code, and amendments thereto.

SECTION 1. That the public interest and convenience require, and that it is the intention of the Commission of the City of Phoenix to order the following work to be done, to-wit:

1. That the roadway of Roosevelt Street from the east line of Central Avenue to the west line of Seventh Street (except that portion now occupied by the tracks of the Phoenix Street Railway Company and two (2) feet on the outside of each rail) and including the intersection of all alleys, private drives wherever shown on the plans hereinafter referred to and including also such portions of intersecting streets, alleys and private drives as is necessary to form an easy approach to the pavement hereinafter described be graded and paved with bitulithic with cement concrete base, bitulithic with no base, cement concrete, "Topeka" Asphalt concrete with cement concrete base, National, "Bitustone" Tarvia filled macadam, Asphalt concrete with bituminous concrete base or Dolarway, as may be hereafter determined.

2. That a combined cement concrete curb and gutter be constructed along both sides of the roadway of Roosevelt Street from the east line of Central Avenue to the west line of Seventh Street, excepting at the intersection of streets, alleys, private drives and approaches thereto as shown on the plans hereinafter referred to.

3. That a cement concrete curb be constructed at the intersection of all alleys, private drives and approaches thereto.

4. That a cement concrete gutter be constructed across the intersections of all alleys, private drives and across the roadway of Roosevelt Street on the east and west side of First Street.

5. That corrugated iron pipe of the size and location be laid as follows: Fifteen (15) inches in diameter across all alleys and private drives and across the roadway of all the intersecting streets with Roosevelt Street as shown on the plans hereinafter referred to.

6. That cement concrete stand-pipes be constructed and gates be set to control the flow of water at the following locations on Roosevelt Street: One (1) at Fifth Street.

7. That that cement concrete pipes of the size shown in the above mentioned stand pipes and corrugated iron pipe to a point six (6) feet back of property line as shown on the plans hereinafter referred to.

8. That a storm water man hole be constructed on Roosevelt Street at Central Avenue, Fourth Street and Fifth Street.

9. That gutter inlets be constructed to receive drainage water at the following locations on Roosevelt Street: Central Avenue two (2), Fourth Street two (2), and Fifth Street two (2), and that said gutter inlets be connected to storm water manholes with the size of cement concrete pipe as shown on the plans hereinafter referred to.

10. That the roadway of the intersecting streets, alleys and private drives be graded from the edge of the aforementioned pavement not to exceed ten (10) per cent until it meets the original surface.

11. That the roadway of the intersecting streets, alleys and private drives be graded from the edge of the aforementioned pavement not to exceed ten (10) per cent until it meets the original surface.

12. That the roadway of the intersecting streets, alleys and private drives be graded from the edge of the aforementioned pavement not to exceed ten (10) per cent until it meets the original surface.

13. That the roadway of the intersecting streets, alleys and private drives be graded from the edge of the aforementioned pavement not to exceed ten (10) per cent until it meets the original surface.

ordinary public benefit, and that said Commission hereby makes the costs and expenses of said work or improvement chargeable upon a district and hereby declares that the district in the said City of Phoenix, benefited by the said work or improvement, and to be assessed to pay the costs and expenses thereof, is described as follows:

All of Churchill and Central Additions being bounded on the north by the center line of McDowell Road, on the south by the center line of Van Buren Street, on the east by the center line of Seventh Street, and on the west by the center line of Central Avenue.

Excepting therefrom any portion of any public street or alley which may be included within the above described districts and excepting also all of Blocks 38, 41, 42 and 43 and Lots 1, 2, 11 and 12, Block 44, Churchill Addition, owned by School District Number 1, Maricopa County, Arizona.

A portion of Block 20, Central Addition, owned by School District Number 1, Maricopa County, Arizona, which certain premises shall be omitted on the assessment hereafter to be made to cover the cost and expenses of said work or improvement and the total costs and expenses of said work or improvement shall be assessed upon the remaining lots or parcels of land lying within the said assessment districts as provided for in Title VII, Chapter XIII, Revised Statutes of Arizona, 1913, Civil Code and amendments thereto.

SECTION 2. That the said Commission finds that public convenience requires that serial bonds shall be issued to represent the costs and expenses of such work or improvement and said Commission determines that serial bonds shall be issued to represent each assessment of Twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars or more for the costs and expenses of said work or improvement. Said serial bonds shall extend over a period ending nine (9) years from and after the second day of January next succeeding the date of said bonds, and an even annual proportion of the principal sum thereof shall be payable by coupon on the second day of January every year after their date until all is paid and the interest shall be payable semi-annually by coupon on the second day of January and July respectively of each year, at the rate of six (6) per cent per annum, on all sums unpaid, until the whole of said principal sum and interest are paid.

SECTION 3. The City Engineer is hereby directed to make a diagram of the districts described hereinabove in Section 2, of this Resolution of Intention, to be assessed to pay the costs and expenses thereof. Such diagram shall show each separate lot, piece or parcel of land in said districts and the relative location of the same to the work proposed to be done.

SECTION 4. The said Commission finds that public convenience requires that serial bonds shall be issued to represent the costs and expenses of such work or improvement and said Commission determines that serial bonds shall be issued to represent each assessment of Twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars or more for the costs and expenses of said work or improvement. Said serial bonds shall extend over a period ending nine (9) years from and after the second day of January next succeeding the date of said bonds, and an even annual proportion of the principal sum thereof shall be payable by coupon on the second day of January every year after their date until all is paid and the interest shall be payable semi-annually by coupon on the second day of January and July respectively of each year, at the rate of six (6) per cent per annum, on all sums unpaid, until the whole of said principal sum and interest are paid.

SECTION 5. The serial bonds herein mentioned shall be issued in accordance with the provisions of Title VII, Chapter XIII, Revised Statutes of Arizona, 1913, Civil Code, and amendments thereto and all the proceedings in the aforementioned improvements shall also be taken under Title VII, Chapter XIII, Revised Statutes of Arizona, 1913, Civil Code, and amendments thereto.

SECTION 6. The City Clerk shall certify to the passage of this Resolution of Intention and shall cause the same to be published ten (10) times in the Arizona Republican, a daily newspaper published and circulated in the City of Phoenix and hereby designated for that purpose.

SECTION 7. The Superintendent of Streets of the City of Phoenix shall post notice of said proposed improvement as required by law, and in said notices shall refer to this Resolution of Intention.

RESOLUTION NO. 174 A resolution of the Commission of the City of Phoenix declaring their intention to improve certain portions of second avenue in the City of Phoenix, and determining that bonds shall be issued to represent the costs and expenses thereof and declaring the work or improvement to be of more than local or ordinary public benefit and the costs and expenses of said work or improvement shall be assessed upon a certain district and providing that the proposed work or improvement shall be performed under the provisions of Title VII, Chapter XIII, Revised Statutes of Arizona, 1913, Civil Code, and acts amendatory thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF PHOENIX:

SECTION 1. That public interest and convenience require and it is the intention of the Commission of the City of Phoenix, to order the following work to be performed, to-wit:

1. That the roadway of Second Avenue from the south line of Van Buren Street to the north line of Van Buren Street (except that portion now occupied by the tracks of the Phoenix Street Railway Company and two (2) feet on the outside of each rail) and including the intersection of all private drives wherever shown on the plans hereinafter referred to and including also such portions of intersecting streets and private drives as is necessary to form an easy approach to the pavement hereinafter described, to be graded and paved with bitulithic with cement concrete base, bitulithic with no base, cement concrete, "Topeka" Asphalt concrete with cement concrete base, National, "Bitustone" Tarvia filled macadam, Asphalt concrete with bituminous concrete base or Dolarway, as may be hereafter determined.

2. That a combined cement concrete curb and gutter be constructed

along both sides of the roadway of Second Avenue from the south line of Fillmore Street to the north line of Van Buren Street excepting at the intersection of private drives and approaches thereto as shown on the plans hereinafter referred to.

3. That a cement concrete curb be constructed at the intersection of all private drives and approaches thereto.

4. That a cement concrete gutter be constructed across the intersection of all private drives as shown on the plans hereinafter referred to.

5. That corrugated iron pipe twelve (12) inches in diameter be laid across the roadway of all private drives as shown on the plans hereinafter referred to.

6. That a storm water manhole be constructed in the roadway of Second Avenue at a point approximately five hundred (500) feet north of Van Buren Street as shown on the plans hereinafter referred to.

7. That two (2) gutter inlets be constructed to receive drainage water at a point approximately five hundred (500) feet north of Van Buren Street, and that said gutter inlets be connected to the aforementioned storm water manhole with the size of cement concrete pipe as shown on the plans hereinafter referred to.

8. That the roadway of intersecting streets and private drives be graded from the edge of the aforementioned pavement not to exceed ten (10) per cent until it meets the original surface.

All of the above work or improvement to be performed in accordance with that certain set of plans approved and adopted by the Commission of the City of Phoenix on the 17th day of March 1916, and on file in the office of the City Engineer in Book Three (3) of Street Improvement Plans on Pages 142 to 148 inclusive and in further accordance with the following specifications:

Standard Specifications of the City of Phoenix Numbers 19, 22, 24 and 28. Curb and gutter work to be done in accordance with Specification Number 21.

Paving to be laid in accordance with the following Specifications, to-wit: In case of bitulithic with cement concrete base Specification Number 20.

In case bitulithic with bituminous concrete base Specification Number 25.

In case bitulithic with no base Specification Number 26.

In case "Topeka" Asphalt Concrete with cement concrete base Specification Number 31.

In case National Pavement Specification Number 33.

In case Concrete Pavement Specification Number 30.

In case "Bitustone" Pavement Specification Number 34.

In case Tarvia filled Macadam Pavement Specification Number 35.

In case Asphalt Concrete with Bituminous Concrete base Specification Number 37A.

In case Dolarway Pavement Specification Number 38.

All of which above specifications are on file in the office of the City Clerk of the City of Phoenix.

Said plans and specifications are hereby referred to for a more particular description of said work and made a part thereof.

SECTION 2. That the said contemplated work or improvement, in the opinion of the Commission, is of more than local or ordinary public benefit, and that said Commission hereby makes the costs and expenses of said work or improvement chargeable upon a district and hereby declares that the district in the said City of Phoenix, benefited by the said work or improvement, and to be assessed to pay the costs and expenses thereof, is described as follows:

All of Bennett, Simms, Chelsea and Kenilworth Additions to the City of Phoenix, being bounded on the north by the center line of McDowell Road, on the east by the center line of Central Avenue, on the south by the center line of Van Buren Street and on the west by the center line of Seventh Avenue, excepting therefrom any portion of any public street or alley which may be included within the above described district.

LABEL SUIT COMES TO SUPREME COURT

Clifton-Morenci Officials Mix Personal Feelings With Statements and Get Into Courts.

The case of J. G. Cash versus J. M. Lally, on appeal from the superior court of Greenlee county, was brought into the supreme court yesterday with Lally as the appellant. Cash had sued Lally for libel and secured a judgment for \$2,500.

Cash was formerly a constable at Clifton, while Lally was a justice of the peace in Morenci. Cash accused Lally of making false statements about him, and causing them to be published in a newspaper at Clifton.

Lally is alleged to have charged Cash with running amuck, starting to clean up the town with a six-shooter, holding up a Mexican and taking several hundred dollars from him, running away with another man's wife, and in fact about all the things that one can accuse another of.

Cash took the matter into court and asked for \$25,000 damages. He secured \$2,500. It is from this decision that Lally is appealing.
