OUR TO BE GREATEST

GANAWAY GETS "LIGHT" SENTENCE

Man Who Altered Meters on P. G. & E. Co. Given \$15 and Suspended Sentence

A. E. Ganaway who was found guilty of unlawfully altering the meters of the Pacific Gas and Electric company was sentenced to ten days in the county jail and fined \$50, the fine being suspended. When he appeared before Justice De Souza yesterday to have his sentence pronounced, P. O. Hernandez, a former employee of the gas company, whose position Ganaway held the past month, stepped forward and asked the court that it deal the minimum penalty. "He has had little chance to protect himself," he said. While the judge gave Ganaway a light sentence he remarked that he did not believe the altering of the meters was an inspiration of the moment. He stated that the defendant had exercised no little cleverness in manipulating the machinery.

ceive and initiate the deplorable practices to which he lent himself, but seemingly became the deluded human instrument of other individuals who, as we have seen, were to themselves, were inimical to the National Guard and sought to achieve its disruption. This belief, derived from the transcript of the testimony, is especially supported by the sworn statement of the defendant, himself, who, when asked by the court concerning the possible sources of such statement derogatory to the guard, as were recently printed in a local newspaper, averred that the war department, the secretary to the governor, Captain Cromwell Stacey and Mr. McLean, at Clifton, were in possession of the information on which the published reports were partly based. While the defendant, in testifying, did not state the connection of Mr. McLean of Clifton, the person who came into possession of official information that concerned him in no proper way, a reasonable assumption of the charges preferred against the said Captain C. V. Gulley is that the defendant, in this portion of his testimony, referred to the Mr. McLean who is connected with the Detroit Copper company and who has heretofore been outspoken in his criticism of the service rendered by the National Guard in protecting life and property in the Clifton-Morenci district during the recently concluded industrial trouble.

It is my honest opinion that the first two possible sources of press information named by the defendant are negligible in these proceedings as being of doubtful sources from which the newspaper statements would very improbably be derived. So far as the remaining two sources are concerned, I have no disposition to draw conclusions beyond that point where they would so extenuate the offense committed as to justify a mitigation of the sentence imposed upon the defendant by the court. It is, however, established to my own satisfaction that the defendant in this action was the misguided, but willing abettor of movements initiated by others, whose hostility towards the National Guard of Arizona was, in no sense, a matter of conjecture. In justice, moreover, to those members of the National Guard who have performed their duties with honor and credit to themselves and to the state's military organization, the acts of which Captain C. V. Gulley has been adjudged

guilty by a court-martial should neither be condoned nor ignored in that measure which would contemplate his continued active service as a company commander.

In keeping, therefore, with the facts above mentioned, I, as Governor, deem it to be the part of justifiable clemency to order that the sentence imposed by the court-martial be so commuted that the aforesaid Captain C. V. Gulley shall not be dishonorably dismissed, but shall be honorably discharged from the service of the National Guard of Arizona, without loss of rank or impairment of his ability to earn and hold future commissions.
