**ARIZONA BOYS AT DOUGLAS SEEM TO BE ENJOYING LIFE**

Letters from Front Indicate that Boys Are Enjoying Life as Soldiers on Border.

Letters received from members of the Arizona regiment now on the border indicate that the boys are faring well and getting along fine. No chord of discontent has been manifested, and all appear to be enjoying themselves.

The following is a digest of a letter received in Phoenix yesterday from one of the non-commissioned officers of the regiment:

"We are camped a few hundred yards from the Mexican line, a short distance to the southwest of the regular camp. Yesterday the Fourteenth infantry moved in and took the site to the north of us. We have about 650 enlisted men and 47 officers with our regiment. Outside of the fact that it is hard to keep clean owing to the constant dust storms which prevail here, we have no kick coming. The camp site is as level as a table, and is laid out almost geometrically correct. The tents make a pretty though business-like appearance. The regulars are a fine crowd and both enlisted men and officers have treated us well and extended us every courtesy.

"I know it is wrong to throw bouquets at ourselves, but quite a few of the regular men have taken occasion to tell us that they have never seen a better looking or better turned-out crowd of national guardsmen.

"Company A is the popular outfit. Whenever there is anything special to do they are greatly in demand. All the companies are settled now comfortably, and with city water piped to the head of each company street we have things almost as comfortable as at home.

"One of the features of the camp is the Indian company and their dog 'Choppo'. The pup is a general favorite all over the camp and we all look upon him as the regimental mascot."

**COMMISSION SITS ALL DAY**

The city commission was in session the greater part of yesterday considering paving matters, listening to protests against paving and considering a number of other important matters.

While it had been previously decided to defer action in the matter of calling a special election to secure a referendum vote of the people on Ordinance No. 126, consolidating the offices of city clerk and city magistrate until the return to the city of Mayor Corpstein, there was considerable discussion of the matter yesterday morning. The city attorney was finally instructed to look up the required procedure and report at the next meeting to be held Saturday morning.

On protest recommendation of City Manager Robert A. Craig are lights were ordered installed at Sixth avenue and Monroe street, Fourth street and Monroe street and First avenue and Fillmore street.

The protest of property owners on Second avenue between Van Buren and Fillmore streets against a forty-six foot paving and asking for paving to the full width of sixty-eight feet, was approved by the commission and full width paving ordered.

A protest against the paving of Roosevelt street between Central avenue and Seventh street, was rejected on the ground that the petition was insufficient. The city attorney was instructed to draw up a proper resolution urging the secretary of the interior not to approve a proposed contract with the Pacific Gas and Electric company until the citizens had opportunity to vote on the proposition to provide a municipal plant.

A report was received from City Auditor Phelan dealing with his work since his appointment a month ago and also carrying an estimate of \$1275 for auditing the city accounts down to date. Action on his estimate was deferred to the next meeting.

The afternoon session was devoted to the reading and adoption of resolutions ordering street improvements. The first orders for Portland street and Fifth avenue in Kenilworth addition as provided in Resolution of Intention No. 170. Others call for the improvement of certain portions of Second avenue, McKinley and Fillmore streets in Bennett addition as provided in Resolution of Intention, No. 171, certain portions of West Roosevelt street, as per Resolution of Intention No. 172, and certain portions of North Central as provided in Resolution of Intention No. 173. A recess was taken to Saturday morning at 10 o'clock.



County Attorney Gives Questionable Resorts No Rest; All Outgrowth of Young Men's Escapades.  
As an outgrowth of the Stevens-Keddington orgy on Sunday night a barbed stand in Phoenix has been raised and two dance halls in Tempe closed. The stand is believed to be the place where the young men secured liquor and the arrest of the proprietor, Henry Williamson, a negro, and Alexander Arvizu, a Mexican employed by him, is believed to be but the beginning of a series of arrests that will be made within the next few days. County Attorney Clyde M. Gandy and Deputy Sheriff J. T. Murphy made a thorough search of Williamson's place of business at Second and Jefferson streets.

A case of beer and two grips containing a large amount of liquor were confiscated. It is alleged that Arvizu sold the liquor on the street for Williamson, who remained at the stand, which was conducted largely as a "booze joint," although there was some pretense of maintaining barbed-ent rest.

The men were arraigned in Judge De Souza's court yesterday. Arvizu waived examination and was held to answer to the superior court in the sum of \$600. He announced his guilt in court.  
Williamson entered a plea of not guilty and his preliminary hearing was set for 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. His bond was placed at \$600.  
Keddington and Stevens, whose latest escapade led to the clean-up of questionable resorts, are still behind the bars. They have been unable to raise the \$1,000 bail that was placed against them.
