Betts, rate expert of the corporation commission, who has been advocating the adding of an amendment to the Keating railroad bill, which would require all common carriers to prefer a bill for undercharges within a stated time, received a wire yesterday that the bill carrying his amendment, would be reported out of the committee on Thursday the 25th of this month.

The news was received with much satisfaction by Betts. He is very sure that the bill and the amendment will pass the house, as he has received letters from all over the country stating that everything possible would be done with representatives to get them to lend their aid towards the passage of the bill.

The Public Service Commission of Indiana yesterday sent a letter stating that they favored the amendment, and would ask their representatives to vote for it.


