GUN BATTLE LANDS TRIO

Deputy Sheriff Murphy Arrests Two Escaped Convicts and Paroled Prisoner, Charged With Burglary of Store

Two escaped convicts and a prisoner on parole were arrested yesterday by Deputy Sheriff J. T. Murphy, charged with new crimes.

In arresting two of the men, Francisco Flores and Lorenzo Felix who are alleged to have robbed a store on South Seventh avenue, Murphy had to resort to the use of his gun. Although Flores and Felix did not return his fire they forced him through barbed wire fencing with the hope that they might make an escape. Murphy did not abandon his man hunt however, despite the fact that he was severely injured. In climbing one of the fences his knee was horribly cut and considerable loss of blood kept him quiet the remainder of the day but he did not let his prisoners behind the bars.

It has been known for some time that there have been several recent escapes from the state prison. Word came to Murphy that Harmon Coto who is serving time in the county jail for robbery was one of these. He questioned Coto closely and the Mexican finally confessed to the officer that he had escaped from Florence. He told Murphy that seventeen year old Carlos Valenzuela who had been his partner in crime and had been turned over to the juvenile court was a bigger thief than he. Valenzuela admitted that Coto's statement was true in part. He said that he had robbed a store on Seventh avenue but that was many weeks ago. "But the store was robbed night before last and I know where you can find the robbers," Murphy was told. The directions given led him to an adobe at Ninth and Buchanan streets. Flores and Felix saw the officer approach. They made a quick get away and had it not been for the deputy sheriff's prompt action would have made their escape.

MANY THINGS MAKE MEMORIAL DAY ONE OF SIGNIFICANCE

Governor Issues Proclamation Calling Attention to Good Fortune of People of this Country.

Proclaiming that the great war across the water has caused Memorial Day this year to be fraught with unusual significance, and that the epoch of the civil war should be celebrated in fitting fashion, Governor Hunt yesterday issued the annual Memorial Day Proclamation, calling upon the people of Arizona to set aside Tuesday, May 30, to fittingly meditate on the deeds of the heroes who gave their lives that the country might be preserved.

Whereas, The veterans of former wars who still survive are justly entitled to that recognition and veneration which becomes particularly the subject of solemn thought on the part of all citizens on that day which is set aside by law as Memorial Day.

Now, therefore, I, Geo. W. P. Hunt, governor of Arizona, by virtue of the authority in me vested, do hereby recommend, in pursuance of nationwide sentiment, that from 12 o'clock, noon, until 5 minutes after 12 of May 30, 1916, which is herein designated and set apart as Memorial Day, each citizen of Arizona shall forsake the duties of everyday living and reverentially meditate upon the sacrifices of our dead heroes, thereby paying fitting tribute to our nation and to the memory of such noble spirits as gave their lives for the preservation of their country.

THREE HANGINGS SET FOR JUNE 9

Yavapai Judge Sentences Mexicans to Hang Early in Triple Affairs Scheduled

PRESCOTT, May 24.—Without an outward sign that they realized the nearness of their impending fate, Manuel Peralta, Eduardo Perez and N. B. Chavez, faced the judge yesterday in the superior court of Yavapai county and were sentenced to be hanged at the penitentiary at Florence on Friday the 9th of June.

Chavez was the first to face the bench. He was represented by T. G. Norris, an attorney, and appeared perfectly at ease when the dread words were pronounced by Judge O. J. Laughton of Pinal county, taking the place of Judge Smith, who was disqualified.

Judge Smith then resented Perez, who, when asked if he had anything to say answered in the negative. Peralta the next to be resented, like his two companions took his medicine like a man.

Ever since they have been brought to Prescott from the Florence prison, the three men have preserved a stolid indifference to all, and have practically refused to talk. Special guards were appointed to watch them day and night, to prevent any possible attempt at escape or suicide.

Prisoners Arrive Here
Accompanied by only two guards, but shackled together, Perez, Chavez and Peralta, the Yavapai county murderers, sentenced to be hanged at Florence June 9, arrived in the city last night from Prescott.

T. J. Simmons, a guard at the state prison, and J. Jacoby, a special deputy, were the only guards during the trip from Prescott, and they report exemplary conduct on the part of the condemned men.

The prisoners were lodged in the county jail last night and will go to Florence this morning, the party augmented by three convicts, who escaped from a road gang west of Phoenix and were recaptured.

PRESCOTT ROAD IS ROUGH BUT PASSABLE

Rich Volk, manager at Hanny's, has just returned from a busy automobile trip to Clarkdale and return. Accompanied by his sister, Mrs. C. M. Spellman, her two children and Harry Patton, he left here early Sunday morning in his trusty young Ford. They arrived at Dewey, which is eighteen miles east of Prescott at 5:45 in the afternoon and drove to Clarkdale, forty-two miles northeast the next morning. After a few hours in Clarkdale, Volk and Patton returned to Dewey and left there Tuesday morning, reaching Phoenix about four Tuesday afternoon. Volk reports absolutely no tire or engine trouble on the entire trip, the total distance of 418 miles having been made in about twenty hours.

Volk took the high road from Hot Springs Junction to Wickensburg, and although it is very rough, says it offers no real difficulties. Although some have been recommending the lower or Garden of Allah road between the two points mentioned, it is reported as practically impassable. Some Phoenix motorists who attempted it last week having found it necessary to be "pulled" for long distances. Copper Basin hill is in splendid shape, but the long grade from the Skull Valley flat to the base of Copper Basin is badly cut up and very soft. From Prescott to Clarkdale the road is remarkably fine and well graded and kept up. At Dewey, Volk spent some time with Chas. Stanton, who is running a very busy and prosperous general store at that point. Stanton was formerly manager of the Hub in Phoenix and has many friends here. Volk reports business conditions exceptionally good in the Prescott, Dewey and Clarkdale country.
