**TOWNS MUST PAY FOR PHONES NOW**

**Judge Lyman Dismisses Tempe's Request to Vacate Corporation Commission Order in Telephone Case**

Judge Lyman of the superior court handed down a decision yesterday in the case of the town of Tempe versus The Arizona Corporation Commission et al., involving points which have been of considerable interest to several municipalities in the state and to those who are interested in judicial interpretation of the corporation commission code. The facts are that when the Mountain States Telephone & Telegraph company purchased competing systems in the state there existed numberless discriminations in the way of unequal rates, service not properly classified, etc., and the commission also found that in many of the smaller towns free telephone service was being given to the towns for franchise privileges, and that these free telephones were invariably installed in the residences of the various city officials, including the city councilmen.

The commission under the provisions of law requiring that improper discrimination be eliminated, entered an order that such free service should be discontinued, and that the city officials should pay precisely as did other users of the telephone, and took the view that when free telephone service was given in return for franchise privileges that such a contract was not a valid one, and that in justice to general users of the service such privilege should be curtailed.

The town of Tempe immediately started action before the commission to set aside the order but the commission refused to do this. Then the town commenced action in the superior court against the commission. In the present instance the state and the commission were represented by the attorney general's office and the Mountain States Telephone & Telegraph company was allowed to intervene. The state through Assistant Attorney General Hardy and the intervenor the Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph company, through its attorneys, H. M. Fennel and W. E. Ryan, immediately moved to dismiss the complaint on the ground that the town had no power to commence such a proceeding. Other grounds were specified and were taken into consideration by the court and the order dismissed. This probably disposes of the matter and in the future municipalities will have to pay for public utility service the same as other consumers.

**SCHOOL LANDERS TAKING APPEALS**

Further resistance by the school land lessees against the board of appraisers of the land commission took form yesterday when seven appeals from the findings of the commission board of appraisers were filed in the office of the clerk of the superior court. The appellants are Jeff Villaborg, J. T. Elter, C. M. Elter, J. D. Elter, Robert Wilson and C. R. Elter. There have been more than twenty appeals from the findings of the board. The appellants make objection to the appraisal of the premises and improvements as wholly inadequate and insufficient.

**BABY DIES**—The ten month-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Stults, died at 4:30 yesterday afternoon at the family home on West Adams street. The funeral will be this morning at nine o'clock from St. Mary's Catholic church.

**PLEADED GUILTY**—G. A. Gonzales, who was arrested by Deputy Sheriff J. T. Murphy a few days ago for bootlegging, was arraigned in the superior court yesterday and entered a plea of guilty. He will be sentenced Monday, at which time sentence will also be passed on Jesus Orduno, who pleaded guilty to forgery.



**TO BUILD SEWER**—The corporation commission yesterday received a request from V. S. Rawley of Mohave county to build a water and sewerage system in the San Francisco mining district of that county. He recites in his petition that he has not asked the supervisors of the county for a franchise, but hastens to add that he will in the near future. The commission have taken the matter under advisement.
