**REFUGEES IN HUGE SWARMS**

Douglas and Other Border Towns Ports of Entry for Many Americans from Mexico; Men Remain, But Send Families Away

Douglas and other border towns are swarming with refugees, according to Leo Bigley, who returned from the south last night. As fast as refugees arrive, they send their families west and north and most of the men are remaining close to the line.

National guardsmen in camp are well fitted up and comfortable. They have access to the town during certain hours, and are allowed to meet and mingle with their friends most of the time. Many of the wives and other relatives of guardsmen are making trips to Douglas.

Fred Matchison, formerly manager of the local telephone company, was one of a party of refugees arriving in Douglas by auto and wagon from Magdalena. They had a sixteen-day trip, says Bigley. At one place, they were stopped by a band of soldiers, who were placated by a generous donation of cigars by Matchison.

Bigley made his tour in the interests of the Inspiration Needles Copper company. His entire allotment of stock was snapped up in Tucson and Biebee but conditions in Douglas were too unquiet to permit of interesting any capital there.

**DE PALMA WINNER AT DES MOINES**

Handsome Ralph Cleans up 150-Miler; Rickenbacher Wins 50-Miler

DES MOINES, June 24.—Twelve thousand people this afternoon saw Ralph De Palma win the Des Moines auto derby at the Iowa speedway.

The winner made the 150 miles in one hour, 37 minutes and 14 seconds, at an average speed of 91.88 miles an hour.

Henderson finished second, Rickenbacher third and Lewis fourth.

The race was a contest between Rickenbacher and De Palma throughout. At 75 miles the former passed De Palma but was forced into third place in the last twenty miles by tire trouble. Henderson nosing him out of second place.

In the fifty-mile free-for-all, Rickenbacher, De Palma, Cooper, O'Donnell and Lewis finished in the order named. The winner's time was 31 minutes, 47 seconds; average, 94.38 miles per hour.

The only accident which marred the race came in the 15-mile event just before the fifteenth lap when a rear wheel on D'Alene's car collapsed, throwing the machine across the track and causing it to collide with the car driven by Milton, who was closely following D'Alene. Neither driver was seriously injured, although the cars were put out of commission.

**FRIAR ROCK WINS BROOKLYN HANDICAP**

August Belmont's Colt Proves Himself Best 3-Year Old on American Turf This Year

NEW YORK, June 24.—By winning the Brooklyn handicap at a mile and one furlong in 1:50 today, August Belmont's Friar Rock by Rock Sand-Fairy Gold, broke the aqueduct race track record for the distance and proved himself to be the best three-year-old colt of the year.

Having previously won the Belmont stakes and the classic Suburban, Friar Rock is the first horse of his age to have the credit of winning both of the big handicaps.

Pennant was second; Slumber II, third; Short Grass, an imported horse, fourth; Roamer, the favorite, fifth; Ardenmont, sixth; Churchill seventh, and Sand March, which made the early race, last. Borrow and Old Koenig had been scratched.

**ARMY DEPOT THREATENED**

**AID FOR SOLDIERS' FAMILIES PLAN OF THE ROTARY CLUBS**

Chicago, June 23.

Claude D. Jones, Rotary Club of Washington, D. C., today passed unanimously following resolution:

Resolved Washington Rotary club tenders to the community its services as a body to do any and all things required of it to bring forth such comfort as the occasion demands to members of the national guard ordered into active service.

It is further resolved that the Washington club subscribe at this time the sum of \$1000 as the nucleus of a fund to be raised for the purpose outlined and invite the cooperation of all other organizations in the city and appoint a special committee to carry out the provisions of these resolutions and confer with any similar committee designated by other bodies.

D. J. CALLAHAN, Pres. Prof. Jones, secretary of the local Rotary club says:

"That telegram shows what live, patriotic, American men are doing in other communities. The chamber of commerce of Phoenix, according to the papers, has appointed a committee to investigate and study conditions in respect to the needs of families of Phoenix guardsmen."

"So far, so good—but let us not temporize! Too much investigation, and too much studying, when action is demanded, is the most solemn criticism of our present administration. There's too much talk about preparedness, and not enough preparing. Let us prepare to do our sacred duty in protecting and providing for the families of our boys at the front. What a sacrifice these families are called upon to make for their country—to make for us! Without our soldiers on the border, Mexican bandits and soldiers could, within ten days, ransack Phoenix, outrage our homes and devastate our beautiful valley. You say absurd? Why? Because between us and the Mexican bandits, the brave American soldier boy who, having given up ease, comfort, friends, loved ones, families—now stands ready to give up his life. In return, shall we not protect and provide for his loved ones? What sacrifices he and his family are making! What are we doing? What should we do?"

"You say we are preparing—we have the home guards—good! Self preservation is the first law of nature; then, can we claim credit for protecting our lives—our homes? Who would not protect his own home? But, how about the homes and families of Arizona's soldiers? Shall we sit by and let Uncle Sam and the soldier boys do it all?"

"The presidents of the chamber of commerce, the Rotary club, and the Merchant and Manufacturing association should at once call upon all civic organizations to appoint committees to meet and organize a citizen's protection committee for the purpose of considering:

1. Plans to co-operate with city authorities for protection of Phoenix.

2. Ways and means of protecting and providing for the families of guardsmen.

3. Patriotic duties of all citizens to provide the Phoenix boys occasionally with some of the comforts of home; as reading matter, tobacco, funds for mess, etc.

"Must our boys feel that we are lacking in patriotism?"

**GODFREY GAMBLING FINE IN TEST CASE**

Chicago, June 24.—Samuel L. Sandovall, Curragua consular agent at the border, taken into custody here four days ago by officers of the state department in connection with a suspected violation of United States neutrality laws, was released tonight. The American authorities announced there was no evidence to warrant his being held.
