STEALS TO SPECULATE

AGAINST PAPER SHIPMENTS

(Republican A. P. Leased Wire) ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Sept. 14.—Resolutions condemning large shipments of paper abroad and endorsing the plan for a three-year educational campaign which it is estimated will cost \$1,000,000, were adopted by the United Typothetae and Franklin Clubs of America at the closing session of their thirteenth annual convention today. The convention also endorsed the national standardization and uniformity plan and the proposition for a sound apprenticeship system.

DETENTION HOME GIRLS ESCAPE

Cutting the wires of the telephone so that the man would be unable to give an alarm and timing their departure so that considerable time would elapse before their absence would be discovered, Stella Langford and Ruth Patterson, two pretty young girls held in delinquency cases, made a sensational escape from the county detention home, 1151 East Van Buren street, early last evening. When word was finally sent to the police department and the sheriff's office, the girls had had abundant opportunity to make a get-away. Two hours after the girls had made their escape, Stella Langford walked into the sheriff's office and announced that she was ready to give herself up. She said that neither she nor the Patterson girl had had outside assistance in leaving the home; that their summary departure was only in the nature of an escapade. She said she was sorry if the incident had caused the authorities any trouble and said that if she were returned to the home, she would make no further effort to escape. Until a late hour no trace of the Patterson girl had been secured, although the sheriff's office believed the officers would be able to locate her shortly. Both the Langford girl and the Patterson girl have recently figured in the most widely-talked-for juvenile delinquency cases of recent months. The former had but recently been brought back from Eugene, Ore., where she is alleged to have been sent by Drs. T. and Rosa Boldo, after escaping from the Florence Crittenden Home, where she was being detained as the prosecuting witness in a case involving young Boldo, who disappeared about the time the girl was taken in custody. For several weeks the authorities had no information as to Stella Langford's whereabouts, but search finally located her in the Oregon city. She had dyed her hair and otherwise changed her appearance, in the hope of preventing recognition by officers who might be searching for her. On the way back to Phoenix in custody of Detectives Larny and Superintendent Christie Gilchrist of the Phoenix Associated Charities, who interested herself in the young girl's case, Stella took very ill aboard the train and was taken to a hospital in Salt Mesa. Believing she was in danger of dying, she is alleged to have made a deposition in which she charged that the Drs. Boldo aided her to leave Phoenix and gave her money to make her way to the home of a daughter of Dr. Rosa Boldo. Since her return to Phoenix, both the Drs. Boldo have been arrested on charges of procuring the absence of witnesses from the state. The case is set for hearing next Monday. Ruth Patterson who is 15 years old and, like Stella Langford, quite recently charged Captain Williams with having taken her in an automobile on a ride into the desert, where he mistreated her. Williams was arrested and later released under \$15000 bail for a hearing set for next Monday morning at 10 o'clock in Justice DeSouza's court. Both the girls had been living with their parents, the Langford family living on East Monroe street and the Pattersons a short distance out of the city. The Patterson girl had been employed at Donofrio's, but later had secured employment at the Sugar Bowl. The disappearance of some of the whereabouts of the young girls, led to the suspicion that she had taken them. She confessed to the theft and then broke down and told her story of her relations with Williams. Last evening both girls had been engaged in washing the supper dishes at the detention home. The matron had been engaged about other duties at the front of the big house. When the absence of the girls was discovered, word was telephoned to Probation Officer W. J. Osborn, who lives five or six miles out in the country, and he came to town as quickly as possible to aid in the search. In the meantime, however, the police and the sheriff's office had made a pretty thorough search of the city without securing a single trace of the whereabouts of the young girls. That the escape had been carefully planned, was indicated by the cutting of the telephone wires and by the selection of a time when the matron might reasonably suppose they were engaged about the household duties of the home.

WON'T ENTERTAIN COMPROMISE

in some manner. Several hundred dollars worth of fire works burned at once. The meeting was very enthusiastic. The appearance of Vice President Marshall, Mr. Glynn, Senator Taggart and other leaders on the platform was the signal for a prolonged demonstration. About twenty-five members of the notification committee, including Mrs. Teresa Graham of Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, and Mrs. Harrison Foster of Tacoma, Wash. Several members of congress and national committeemen attended the ceremonies.

"Two Italian battalions, one squadron of cavalry and one battery, advanced in the direction of Butkova and Druma. Our detachments attacked them energetically and put them to flight. The enemy retired and was pursued by our troops. We captured one officer and eighty-seven men. This was our second encounter with Italians."
PARIS, Sept. 14.—On the Somme front the French have captured Lapriez farm and enlarged other positions close to Comblis, according to the official statement issued by the war office tonight. There was hard fighting north and south of Bouchavesnes. The Germans made vigorous efforts last night to drive the French from territory captured recently on the Somme and Verdun fronts. The war office today announced the repulse of several assaults north and south of the Somme and east of the Meuse at Vaux-Chapitre wood. Serbians and Bulgarians are engaged in violent fighting on the Macedonian front. The war office announced today that the Serbians had captured Bulgarian trenches near Vetrenik and a height north-

west of Lake Ostrovo. An engagement south of the lake is turning in favor of the allies.
To Leave For Berlin
BERLIN, Sept. 14. (via London).—The Rumanian minister to Germany, Dr. Beldiman, will soon leave Berlin for Denmark, where he will take up his residence. It was announced today. How many Rumanian private citizens now in Germany will be permitted to accompany the minister will not be known until it is ascertained how many Germans and Austrians were allowed to leave Bucharest with the ministers of those countries. Repeated and violent assaults against the Germans on the Somme front yesterday were repulsed with sanguinary losses for the allies. Following is the announcement: "On the Somme, the artillery firing on both sides increased until it reached the greatest violence. Heavily armed attacks by the enemy against Gheny and the Somme and at several points south of the river were repulsed. In counter attacks ground was gained at places. Prisoners were taken and booty was captured.
"On the right bank of the Meuse, (Verden front), infantry engagements developed west of the Souville salient accompanied at times by very lively activity of the artillery in the Thiamont-Chahatre sector."
According to a Sofia dispatch to the Overseas News agency, Bulgaria is greatly aroused over the atrocities upon Bulgarians in Dobruja charged against the Rumanians, and the entire press is demanding punitive measures. The Bulgarian government, adds the dispatch, intends to invite the diplomatic representatives of neutral countries at Sofia to make an investigation of the district and will register an energetic protest with neutral powers.
Not Satisfied With Program
ATHENS, Sept. 14. (via London, Sept. 15).—The entente powers are not satisfied with the program outlined by M. Dimitracopolis, whose acceptance of the premiership was based on full power to control the national policy. M. Dimitracopolis has therefore abandoned his effort to form a cabinet.
