ANDREW DOWNING IS BACK FROM LONG TRIP

Mr. Andrew Downing returned on Sunday from an extended tour of the middle states, of nearly 6,000 miles, 2,500 of which was made by automobile. Mr. Downing left Phoenix ten weeks ago on a visit to his brother who lives in Harper county, Kansas. He accompanied his brother and the wife of the latter in an automobile trip to northwestern Nebraska, where another brother whom he had not seen for many years, lives. The trip was made along the meridian line that runs north from Galveston and the road runs almost straight. After that Mr. Downing and party visited relatives and old acquaintances throughout Nebraska, Iowa, Illinois, Missouri and Kansas. Altogether he was the guest of forty families. The automobile trip was not marred by accident or rain.

Mr. Downing said that wherever he went he found a strong sentiment in favor of Hughes and a general belief that he would be elected. That sentiment seemed to culminate in a great Hughes meeting in the Convention Hall at Kansas City. There was an audience of 15,000 that packed the great hall to the roof. For ten minutes after Mr. Hughes was introduced, there was a pandemonium of enthusiasm. Mr. Downing had never witnessed anything like it.
