

ARMED GUNS HURL BOMBS AT GERMAN POSITIONS

DURING WORK OF CONSTRUCTION BY GERMAN FORCES OF TRENCHES KEEP UP THEIR BOMBARDMENT

(By Republican A. P. Leased Wire) Except for a fresh British attack, which gave them the greatest part of a German redoubt north of Thiepval and 600 prisoners, the troops of the entente in the region between the Somme and Ancre rivers in France, apparently are taking a breathing spell and consolidating positions captured in the great offensive which began last Monday and has already netted them Comblis, Thiepval and other strong German positions at various points along the twenty-mile front.

Hughes Denies Urged Filibuster Against Adamson Bill NEVER ONE IN RED VILLAGES ARE KILLED

MICHIGAN CENTRAL BANDITS ARE STILL AT LARGE DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 28.—The robber who held up the New York-Chicago express on the Michigan Central railroad, ten miles west of here last night, still at large today. Government detectives and Detroit officers, at the head of searching parties, said no clues had been obtained. One of the two registered mail pouches which were taken from the mail car was found today about 100 yards from where the robbers stopped the train. The pouch was slit and was empty.

SEVERE BATTLE IS REPORTED AT CUSHURACHIC CHIHUAHUA CITY, Mex., Sept. 28.—Over a hundred Villistas were killed, the bandit leader Baudelio Uribe taken prisoner and heavy casualties suffered by Carrancista forces in a terrific fight at Cushurachic, an important center about 50 miles southwest of Chihuahua City, according to a message received this afternoon by General Trevino from General Ramos, who himself was slightly wounded. The details of the fight were few and merely appended to the request of General Ramos for surgeons and medical supplies. A hospital corps detachment was accordingly rushed to the scene by train.

TO ADOPT BILL IF DETERMINED WHY ANY DELAY [Republican A. P. Leased Wire] SARATOGA SPRINGS, N. Y., Sept. 28.—Charles E. Hughes tonight told the Republican unofficial convention here that he had no urged republican senators to filibuster "to the last ditch" against the passage of the Adamson eight-hour law, passed to avert the threatened railroad strike. The nominee declared he did not believe in filibustering for one thing, and that if the majority in congress had determined to pass the bill there was no reason whatever why its passage should have been delayed by filibustering tactics.

WILSON BEGINS HIS CAMPAIGN SOON DE DRY WRITING NOTES [Republican A. P. Leased Wire] LONG BRANCH, N. J., Sept. 28.—In a message opening his campaign of letter writing, President Wilson declared tonight that the question is about to be determined whether we shall keep the nation upon its present terms of peace and good will with the world or turn to radical changes of policy which may alter the whole aspect of the nation's life.

North of Thiepval LONDON, Sept. 28.—The British forces have captured the greater part of a German redoubt north of Thiepval, which overlooks the northern valley of the Ancre, taking nearly 500 prisoners, according to the official statement from general headquarters issued at midnight. Takes Schwaben Redoubt WITH THE BRITISH ARMY IN THE FIELD IN FRANCE, Sept. 28.—(Via London, Sept. 28)—"You have just time to get into a tree top and see us go after the Schwaben redoubt," said a staff general, the correspondent of the Associated Press today.

TOUR OF FARM LOAN BOARD IS BROUGHT TO END WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—The federal farm loan board returned to Washington today after a tour through twenty-nine states to gather information for its guidance in dividing the country into twelve farm loan districts, and designating the sites of the twelve banks authorized under the rural credits law. The tour began at Augusta, Maine, August 31, and took the board to the Pacific coast, and as far south as Missouri. A similar trip will be taken soon through other states in the south and southwest.

REPORT FIGHT AT INDIO PRESIDIO, Tex., Sept. 28.—A report that nine American soldiers crossed to the Mexican side at Indio, 20 miles up the Rio Grande from here and captured 120 prisoners, including three Americans and four Mexicans were killed, reached here today from private sources. The military authorities at El Paso, neither side would say what matters were discussed.

OPPOSITION OF WILSON GIVES CANDIDATE POPULAR STRENGTH [Special to The Republican] NEW YORK, Sept. 28.—Commenting upon the results of the primaries in New Jersey and Massachusetts this week, William R. Willcox, chairman of the republican national committee, said today that more hard blows had been dealt to the democratic proposition than the president is stronger than his party.

TRYING TO ESTABLISH AN ALIBI FOR PANCHE VILLA [Republican A. P. Leased Wire] EL PASO, Texas, Sept. 28.—Further efforts to establish an alibi for Francisco Villa at Columbus and Santa Isabel are being made on the American side of the Rio Grande. This movement is said here to be fanned by persons interested in starting another revolution against the de facto government.

DR. MONTEZUMA OFFERS TO GIVE DR. COOLIDGE LICKING [Republican A. P. Leased Wire] CEDAR RAPIDS, Iowa, Sept. 28.—At the second day's session of the Society of American Indians here, an Apache challenged an Arapahoe to combat during a clash over a resolution proposing the abolition of the federal Indian bureau.

BIG SYMPATHETIC WALKOUT IN NEW YORK NEW YORK, Sept. 28.—The widely exploited sympathetic walk-out of trades unionists in Greater New York in aid of the striking car men, which was supposed to have started yesterday, had not materialized tonight, according to the police. The labor leaders, however, claimed that upwards of 140,000 workers actually had quit their places but refused to make public the names of any unions answering the call. The police declared they were unable to find any evidence of a general strike.

NEGOTIATIONS COMPLETED BERNE, Switzerland, Sept. 28.—(Via Paris)—Dr. Arthur Hoffman, foreign minister, today announced that economic negotiations between Germany and Switzerland had been completed satisfactorily. It was arranged here that each country should supply to the other what was urgently needed for home consumption except such articles as Switzerland had bound itself not to export.

NEW BLACKMAIL SCHEME ON ROADS OVER STATE LINES [Republican A. P. Leased Wire] NEW YORK, Sept. 28.—A black-mailing scheme reported to be in operation on railroad crossing state lines by which attractive women swindle male travelers with the aid of men confederates, is being investigated by special agents of the department of justice it was disclosed here today. Information of the swindle was sent anonymously to John C. Knox, assistant district attorney, who is in charge of the "blackmail syndicate" cases in New York and other cities.

RETURN FALSE TEETH CONSIGN TO GERMANY LONDON, Sept. 28.—In connection with the recent release for the return to America of a consignment of false teeth addressed to Germany, an official of the admiralty said today that one of the recent seizures of teeth consigned to Germany, some having rubber plates and others composed of materials supposedly needed badly in Germany.
