

THESE SHEEP LICKS MET WITH SUCCESS IN THE ANTIPODES

According to W. T. Ritch, Australian sheep expert who visited Phoenix last week, there are no sheep licks on the markets which can be given to the sheep without danger. He gave out the following prescriptions for sheep licks such as are used in Australia, and have met with excellent results.

- To keep sheep in good health flock owners would profit by having one of the following "licks" placed in convenient parts of the pasture.
- No. 1.
 - Slacked lime 6 lbs.
 - Sulphate of iron 4 lbs.
 - Crushed salt 112 lbs.
 - Thymol 1/2 pint
- Mix thoroughly and put in troughs with protection from rain.

- No. 2.
 - Salt 214 lbs.
 - Sulphate of iron 14 lbs.
 - Sulphur 4 lbs.
 - Glucose 2 lbs.
- Place in troughs protected from rain. This mixture when thoroughly blended to a powder acts as a tonic and keeps the sheep in good condition.

- No. 3.
 - Flowers of sulphur 1/2 gal.
 - Fulminated copper 3 pints
 - Crushed salt 1 bushel
- First see that this is well mixed, then dissolved in hot water, thoroughly stirred, and afterwards allowed to set.

- No. 4.
 - Coarse salt 1 cwt.
 - Slacked lime 10 lbs.
 - Bonemesh 10 lbs.
 - Flowers of sulphur 4 lbs.
- Mix well in a trough and keep protected from rain. It is a good plan to mix above with molasses sufficient to hold it together. This particular lick happens to be suitable for cattle as well as sheep.

The above licks are highly recommended by the colleges in Australia for sheep grazing on natural grasses and having to roam long distances without finding much variety in their food. These licks have also been found very beneficial to flocks grazing under various conditions in New Zealand, Falkland Island, South Africa and South America.

Although any of these licks will produce excellent results, flock owners and shepherds should use some discretion in making their selection. Apart from what may be necessary as a tonic, select the lick most likely to give what is deficient in the pasture. Regulate the quantity according to the size of the flock.

BEAN RUST DOES ENORMOUS DAMAGE

This is a common disease of the bean, and one which does considerable damage. Varieties differ a great deal in their susceptibility to this disease, some being practically immune, while others are very susceptible. I recall two varieties of pole beans in the University gardens in 1914, the Kentucky Wonder being very badly affected, while the Laxy Wife was not affected at all.

An old adage which contains some wisdom, says: "Never cultivate beans while the vines are wet." While the vines are wet they are in a better

CAREFUL BRAKING WILL SAVE TIRES

To get maximum tire mileage, be careful with your brake. But according to Mr. C. K. Hughes of the Auto Supply company, local distributors for the Savage Tire company, some motorists do not consider the things that way, so probably a better way of saying it is "Be careful with your brake if you wish to keep down tire costs."

Every time you jam on your brake you directly affect your pocketbook. There are, of course, emergencies when it is absolutely necessary to slow down or come to a full stop in the shortest possible time. Tire costs are not to be considered in these emergencies, but such occasions can be greatly lessened, if not altogether eliminated by care in driving.

You cannot lock the wheels on your car when traveling at any speed without seriously damaging your tires. When wheels are locked the tires are slid over the road. Tread surfaces are often scraped—nearly always if the road surface be rough. The result is a permanent weak spot, which in all probability will lead to the premature destruction of the tire.

There is quite a lot of abuse in braking—as a matter of fact, a car can be stopped just as soon, if not more quickly, when the wheels are not locked, as when they are anyway, slowing up before the corners and rough places, is a lot better than paying repair bills or buying new tires afterward.

The massive, rugged treads on Savage tires stand a lot of abuse, and give good service under the most severe conditions, but drivers should remember that our tires give good service, not because of this abuse, but in spite of it, and every driver should realize that a Savage or not, will give better service and more and cheaper mileage if among other things the driver will use care in applying the brakes.

"SAFETY NEWS" TO BE PRINTED IN SPANISH

Beginning November first the State Safety News, published monthly by the State Bureau of Mines, will also be published in Spanish, inasmuch as the proportion of Spanish laborers in the mines of Arizona is large, and the necessity for education along safety lines is even greater for these employees than Americans, it is felt that considerable benefit would be derived by constantly putting before them the signs of safety first.

These bulletins will be for free distribution, and anyone interested will be put on the mailing list. INCONSISTENCIES IN PRICES OF COPPER

An editorial of interest to the mining fraternity of Arizona is to be found in the September 30th number of the Mining & Scientific Press. It relates to the prices and quotations on copper and the apparent inconsistency of the quotations of various papers and magazines.

There is necessarily a considerable amount of inaccuracy in the mining journal quotations, as they are based on the prices of the sale of the bulk of copper from very incomplete returns from the producers and selling agencies, and under the present market conditions the sellers in many cases do not report all that occurs. The fact that there are many different kinds of copper tends towards inaccurate quotations and naturally the quotation for prompt delivery is different from the average price for unspecified future delivery.

Recently a letter from Mr. Walter Deuzias was featured in the local press, and while he says that the figures quoted are as accurate as it is humanly possible to compute them, there have been many discrepancies in some cases quotations being higher than the price actually paid and in other cases, lower.

The editorial in the mining press is well worth reading by anyone whose daily wage is based upon the sliding scale of wages.
