

HOUSE ADJOURNS WITH PROMISE OF APPROPRIATION AGREEMENT TO PREVENT AN EXTRA SESSION

The house was deadlocked yesterday over the general appropriation bill and things took such a sudden turn in the morning session that for a time after adjournment it looked as if the members would have to be pried apart. They stood in groups and shook their fingers at one another, changing improper motives and had faith in the course of the day, in two short sessions, only business of the regular order was transacted and the majority announced that no further business would be transacted until there was a recognition of the democratic principle of majority rule.

After the disposition of the regular order in the morning, Mr. Lines of Graham, who had just introduced House Bill No. 128, the new appropriation bill an exact copy of the old one, the emergency clause omitted, moved a suspension of the rules, and the advancement of House Bill No. 128 to second reading. Mr. Fluke of Nevada asked what the bill contained. Mr. Lines explained briefly the character of it; all were familiar with it, he said. Mr. Vaughn insisted on seeing the bill before concurring in a suspension of the rules. He intimated that being told a bill was so and knowing it was so were often two quite different things. The atmosphere was heavily charged; the situation was tense, to fill into dramatic error.

The Lines motion went to a vote quickly and failed by a single vote of the necessary two-thirds of the membership of the house. The vote was almost a replica of that of the day before when the general appropriation bill failed. A member of each faction was raising Mr. Hughes of the majority and Mr. Walton of the minority. The result was: Ayes—Baxter, Brewer, Buchman, Coffey, Curran, Davis, Fairies, Goodwin, Green, Hicks, Lines, Mahoney, Malby, McCormick, McGrath, O'Neil, O'Connell, O'Neill, (Maricopa), Perkins, Peterson, Richardson, Sullivan, the Speaker—22.

Nays—Book, Edie, Edwards, Fluke, Forter, Francis, Houser, Marsh, McKay, Vaughn, Wilbanks—11. Immediately Mr. Lines moved a recess until 2 o'clock in the afternoon. This motion was evidently a surprise. There were more than a hundred bills on the calendar and near the top of them was the minimum wage bill on which his advocates were constantly expecting action. Instantly Mr. Fluke was on his feet impugning the motives of the majority to whom he attributed his losses, intending to run something down in the throat of the minority. Speaker Johns called him to order and admonished him against the use of personalities. Mr. Fluke disclaimed, having mentioned the name of any party in which the objection was raised that Cochise was likely to be divided at any time and before, cut up into three counties. Mr. Johns replied that they had been talking about dividing Cochise county ever since he could remember. The bill he said, was intended to meet a most urgent need which could not be dispensed on account of military contingencies.

From the headquarters of the Arizona Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis, it is reported that the Red Cross sale in Arizona has beaten all previous records, and that Phoenix has sold by far a larger number than any other city in the state. The total sale for the entire state was 222,275 seals, which is an increase of 114,465 over last season, and is the best record Arizona has made in this date.
