TO ORDER NO MORE MEN TO CAMP UNTIL SUPPLIES ARE READY

No more men will be sent to Camp Funston or to any other national army camp until there is sufficient clothing and proper accommodations for them. This very interesting information is conveyed in a letter received by Congressman Carl Hayden from Newton D. Baker, secretary of war, and is in answer to Mr. Hayden's complaint by wire after his recent visit to Camp Funston where he found many men, including Arizona men, suffering from a lack of clothing and bedding.
