

DEATH SUMMONS NOBLE PIONEER OF OLD ARIZONA

Answering swift and unexpected summons another of the great figures in the life and history of Arizona has passed out to join the noble company of pioneers in the land beyond. After an illness of only two days Judge W. P. Nichols died in Los Angeles Thursday morning.

By his passing both Arizona and California loses a pioneer—for though his life was not exceptionally long, six years are numbered. It had included a very unusual knowledge of the early years and later development of both states.

Mr. Nichols was born in Massachusetts in 1832, and something of the finest ideals of his New England ancestry always seemed to color his personality, in spite of his western education and experience.

city they soon removed, and here and in Oakland the boy received his education.

His boyhood and young manhood were spent in the California of the Argonauts—the California whose splendid, gold-threaded romance is the richest chapter in the history of the United States.

The men who move in and out of Bret Harte's deathless stories walked up and down the streets of Sacramento; they came in "flush" and spent their gold dust and nuggets and went out "broke," with a "grab-stake" borrowed from someone luckier to fill their own buckskin bags again on the bars along the streams of Trinity and Shasta and the great Sierras.

The boy saw them come and go, and unconsciously absorbed the greatness of the strong, free, formative years of the great state, so that to the end, one looking at him thought of the Argonauts and empire builders of the older west.

After various business ventures, more or less important, in California, Mr. Nichols came to Arizona in time to share the romance of the bonanza days of Charleston and Tombstone and later settled in Wilcox—then the Arizona which Alfred Henry Lewis has pictured so vividly in his Wolfville stories. The truth, as Judge Nichols loved to tell it, was better than anything that Lewis recorded, and he himself, many years justice of peace as well as business man, was one of the best figures in it all.

It was inevitable that a man of Mr. Nichols' wise and beloved judgment and peculiar power and charm should be drawn into politics and for many years he served the state in various capacities; auditor, secretary of state, etc., and everywhere with that fine sincerity, dignity and inflexible honesty which was the keynote of his public life.

Mr. Nichols was essentially and always a scholar, an intellectual, and when the inner history of the later years of the territorial government is written, it will be seen how great a part he had in shaping the lines on which the state has grown and expanded.

At the height of his political career Mr. Nichols retired from public life and removed from Phoenix, which had been his home for some years, to Los Angeles, where he resided until his death.

Mr. Nichols was one of the most prominent Masons in the state, and had received all the honors which that order can bestow. He will be mourned by Masons as a brother whose character exemplified the noblest precepts of the order and whose life honored Masonry as truly as it could honor him.

The most beautiful chapter in the life of Judge Nichols was that of his home; his wife, who was Mrs. Norah Seeley Butterfield, was a brilliant and gracious woman of warmest sympathies, who shared his public life and was his closest counselor and finest inspiration. She will be long remembered in Phoenix and Wilcox, as well

as in Los Angeles, where her death occurred some years ago.

Mr. Nichols left warm friends all over Arizona as well as in California, who will keep him in loving remembrance. Those nearest to him are Mrs. Alice Butterfield Hewins, who with her husband, L. E. Hewins of Phoenix, left for Los Angeles on last night's train, and Mrs. M. H. Wangenheim, a niece, who with her children, Henry and Margaret, reside in Los Angeles.

REAL SLICKER IS ROUNDED UP

Enrique Arviso is in the city jail and his fraudulent check operations, extending over a period of several weeks, have been halted. Policeman McGrath and Crowe yesterday succeeded in apprehending the much-wanted man and in securing a complete confession from him. The officers had in their possession 40 or 50 checks that Arviso admitted he had cashed at various business houses and they believe there are still many bad checks still unreported, for the passage of which Arviso is responsible.

Several weeks ago reports began coming to the police of the check operations of a well-dressed, well-spoken Mexican. In several instances excellent descriptions were given. The police gave no end of time to the work of locating the unidentified youth. They compiled practically a complete census of young Mexicans in any manner answering the descriptions given. More than a score of suspects were picked up, questioned, taken before business men who had cashed the worthless checks and then turned loose.

Finally suspicion began to point to Arviso. He had not been seen much about town recently, evidently keeping pretty well to the back streets and only making hasty excursions up town when he needed a little money. So smoothly did he work his game that the business houses he visited hardly questioned him. He would make a small purchase and secure the difference in cash. He never took any of the goods to his home. An automobile standing at a curb furnished a good means of disposing of these articles. Sometimes he would drop groceries into the wagon of some Indian. Other times he would order articles delivered at addresses that did not exist. All this he admitted to the police yesterday and then he was locked up.
