I have seen many strange sights in France, some of which I cannot tell on account of the censorship. But I know you would enjoy the old castles with their historical dungeons and towers; and also the peculiar cities with their ancient houses of several floors, and many bables. I was especially interested in one of the ancient churches which I attended on the way to duty last Sunday. The interior was really a thing to see. The paintings and statues were truly wonderful.

But after those things are all seen I am of the opinion that America is far ahead in every respect and its people are without a peer.

It only seems a very short time since the summer day I left the office at Erie, Pa., to join the army. It is yet a new year has come and with it my twenty milestones.

Was down your way about a year ago. I went out and spent exposition year with my old aunt, who lives in Glendale, California. The prosperous condition of the east brought me home and on the way I took the Santa Fe, stopping off at the Grand Canyon, which is the most marvelous sight I have ever seen. But the call of the west is a hard thing to shake off and after the war I am going back to stay.

PLAN ADDITION TO STATE HOUSE

Plans for the construction of the new addition to the state capitol are to take definite shape soon, according to Leroy A. Ladd, chairman of the state corporation commission. General plans already have been prepared, but detail work had not been commenced until some time ago when architects were started on that interesting work.

What departments of the state are to make their home in the new addition to the capitol is a matter that has not been decided, stated Mr. Ladd yesterday. However, there are plenty of "overflow" departments to more than fill the new addition.

"The exterior of the new addition will, of course, correspond with the remainder of the capitol," stated Mr. Ladd, "but in the interior finishing it will far surpass the old building. The commission is giving considerable attention to the plans for the new capitol addition, and there will be no delay in the work.

Imposing steps may be constructed at the main entrance of the capitol, rising to the floor on which is located the offices of the governor, secretary of state, state treasurer and supreme court, making that the first floor. While no statement was made that such an improvement is to be made in the near future, Mr. Ladd, however, declared that in his opinion such a flight of entrance steps was needed. The legislative appropriation of \$75,000 for addition to the capitol makes no provision for the building of entrance steps.

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
