FINANCES AND MARKETS

[Republican A. P. Leased Wire] NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—On a moderate curtailment of operations today's stock market continued to manifest much of its recent quiet strength. War bulletins found their most direct expression in another advance of Paris exchange to the highest level of the current movement. Trading concentrated to an overwhelming degree in United States Steel that stock eclipsing all other issues in its further progress to the year's new maximum of 114 1/2. This extreme gain of 1 1/4 points was reduced to a fraction at the close. Copper was tossed out of their predicted lethargy. Utah American Smelting and Anaconda featuring that

Independent steels and kindred industrial and equipments were 1 to 1 1/2 points higher at their best. Sales amounted to 200,000 shares. Liberty issues and the domestic bond list were irregular. Total sales, par value, aggregated \$6,875,000. Old U. S. coupon 4 1/2s were a half cent lower on sales.

GRAIN CHICAGO, Aug. 28.—Liquidation of corn continued today, but it was scattered and the net result was a decline of 1/2 cent in September and one and one-half cents in October options. The range of prices covered an extreme three cents and the close, while at a recession, was 1 to 1 1/2 cents better than the bottom. Shorts covered on the government weather report.

October closed at \$1.54 1/2. Bears noted that No. 3 white corn sold at Indianapolis at \$1.60; also the large receipts, the easiness of the sample market and the fact that cattle and hogs on feed were reported less than a year ago.

The price of oats as usual was guided by corn. In the sample market No. 2 white continued to sell at one cent under September. Cash interest was sellers of October and buyers of September, but there was also outright selling of September, probably hedging. The close was 1/2 @ 5/8 cent lower.

Provisions were dull but advanced 1 1/2 @ 20 cents in sympathy with higher hogs. The government was reported to have asked for tenders on corn and meat, which also helped the price. September lard advanced to a parity with October.
