FIGHT FOR RATE ADVANCE

[Republican A. P. Leased Wire] DENVER, Dec. 9.—Officials of the Pueblo Gas and Fuel company today presented testimony before the Colorado utilities commission, in support of its petition for increases in its rates for gas. Although City Attorney C. M. Bone of Pueblo was present, neither he nor any others lodged protests against the proposed rate increase. The commission deferred its decision on the petition.

The company is asking for approval on a schedule which will increase the present rate of \$1.10 per thousand feet for gas for domestic purposes, to \$1.25, and the present rate of 95 cents per thousand for gas for industrial purposes, to \$1.10. James Daly, manager of the company, testified that even if the increases are granted, the net revenue for 1919 will fall short, by \$10,000, of making the interest on the bonded indebtedness of \$812,000 against the property of the company.
