



MESA, April 7.—Beginning tomorrow, the Mesa public schools will adopt the new time. This action was taken first at a meeting of the grade school trustees and in the evening at the session of the high school board. The trustees in adopting the new time, state that there is a great diversity of opinion among the patrons of the school as to whether to continue with the old time or adopt the new, but the confusion resulting from families having to govern their actions by both times, justified the change.
