FIRST SETTLERS OF MESA HELP OBSERVE PIONEERS' DAY FETE

MESA, July 25.—Pioneer's Day was fittingly observed yesterday in the carrying out of a program of music, readings and other forms of entertainment, in the Vance Auditorium. Committees had been appointed for the different wards to see that the old people had a way to reach the building, where they were entertained by the younger generation and the children of the primary association.

The first entry of the Mormons into the Lehi and Mesa vicinity was in the years 1877 and 1878. First came, from Utah and Idaho, a company which after months of journeying rested upon the south bank of the Salt River and began the work of building a home on the desert. Of this company, that is those who were married at the time of their arrival here, there are yet living, Mrs. Emma Rogers, Mr. and Mrs. D. P. Jones, Mrs. W. G. Shill and Mrs. Serena B. Steele.

In the following year, 1878, the company which settled where the town of Mesa now stands, arrived. There were 72 people in this band, of whom there were nine married couples. Of these heads of families, with their wives, there exist today the following, all of whom live either in or near Mesa: Mrs. Sarah Pomeroy, Mrs. William Schwartz, Mrs. Ellen Crisman, E. Pomeroy, W. L. Serrano, W. M. Newell and Mrs. Jessie D. Hobson.

These people rested two months, while en route, on the banks of the Verde, then came on to the desert country, now changed to fertile fields and the thriving town of Mesa. They found naught save cactus and desert growth, but while the Lehi settlers began the digging of the Lehi Canal, these last began on the canal system of the Mesa, and thus was started the irrigation system of this section. It is a fact though that years, even centuries before, there had existed an irrigation system leading out from the Salt River, and when the Lehi and Mesa settlers through their engineers ran the lines of their canals, they were found to correspond in the main with the remains of the irrigation ditches of the vanished race who in ages past had evidently grown their crops upon land that had long since returned to a desert waste.

 - Fourth precinct—Northwest corner Second avenue and Madison street.
 - Sixth precinct—City hall.
- The territory in each of the precincts is as follows:
- First precinct—Bounded on the east by Seventh avenue, on the north by the city limits, on the west by the city limits, and on the south by Washington street.
 - Second precinct—Bounded on the south by Washington street, on the north by the city limits, on the west by Seventh avenue, and on the east by Central avenue.
 - Third precinct—Bounded on the south by Washington street, on the north by the city limits, on the east by Fifth street and on the west by Central avenue.
 - Fourth precinct—Bounded on the south by Washington street, on the north by the city limits, on the east by the city limits, and on the west by Fifth street.
 - Fifth precinct—All south of Washington street and west of Central avenue.

CORPORATION COMM. GOES TO WINSLOW

All the members of the corporation commission, led by Ben Ferguson, the engineer for the commission, will go to Winslow today to hold a hearing in the water situation. The hearing is for the purpose of making service rules and charges for water service in Winslow. About a year ago the water consumers in Winslow were put on meters, and the board set temporary rates. These have in part been found unsatisfactory in the cases of large users of water for lawns and gardens, and the commission will now make an investigation and set permanent rates.
