


Go to Church Sunday

"The Apache" Million-Dollar Hotel, To Be Completed In Twelve Months And To Give Phoenix The Finest Hotel In The South



FLYERS READY FOR BIG AIR RACE TO STATE FAIR

Final Details of Cross-Country Flight from Los Angeles Now Being Completed —Noted Men Are Coming

Success is assured the aerial race from Los Angeles to Phoenix as a feature of the state fair program, according to a wire from Bert Barr, superintendent in charge, who is now in Los Angeles arranging the final details of the big cross-country flight.

Barr has succeeded in securing four entries to date. The machines will be piloted by Frank Clark, Al Wilson, "Sideslipper" Cardiff and Lieutenant Goldsworthy. These men are all well-known as expert flyers in army circles.

Lieut. Goldsworthy was army instructor at Mather and Rockwell fields. Dare Devil Campbell, also noted as a stunt flyer, is coming as a mechanic for one of the machines. Clark, Goldsworthy and Campbell recently staged a flying circus at El Centro, which created great interest in the coming Los Angeles to Phoenix race.

While the accompanying architects' sketch of the new million-dollar hotel to be erected in Phoenix and for which the name "The Apache" has been selected, gives a good impression of the magnificent and lofty outlines of the hotel and what a great and impressive building it will be, yet it cannot show the soft and pleasing blending of the colors of the brick, marble, tile, terra cotta and stone which makes it the most ornate structure of the kind in the southwest.

With the financing of the new hotel completed and the work of razing the old Central school building on the site almost done, actual construction work on the new hotel will be begun in a short time. It is expected that the building of "The Apache" will require about 12 months.

The new hotel is to be built in the form of a letter U, with a court in the middle and the wings turning toward Central avenue. The entire structure will be of reinforced concrete, strictly fire-proof and of the highest class of construction in every particular. It will be nine stories in height with the height relieved by decorative balconies and trimmings so that the whole is indeed pleasing.

What is said to be the greatest feature of the new hotel is a palatial roof garden with a banquet hall capable of seating 400 persons at tables and of accommodating 1,200 in convention or other general meetings. There will be 330 guest rooms, each with bath

direct line to Beaumont, California, thence to El Centro, Yuma and Phoenix. In any event it has been decided to route the race between Yuma and Phoenix along the Gila river rather than the Southern Pacific tracks; the usual route in order to escape the pocket air condition between Sentinel and Gila Bend. This section has long been the dread of flyers making the trip across the desert.

To Fix Landing Field Upon his return next week Barr will immediately place the landing field at the fair in condition. A space 600 feet wide by 1,800 feet in length has been reserved for landing purposes at the fair. This space lies in full view of the grand stand, being located on the east side of the half-mile track and between its outer edge and the inside of the mile track.

With the completion of the Apache, Phoenix will be in the very front rank with hotel accommodations. No city in the southwest will be able to offer tourists greater luxury in hotel accommodations than Phoenix. Also it will relieve in great measure the lack of hotel accommodations which has become notorious in this city and which has caused many hundreds of intended winter visitors to go elsewhere for lack of a satisfactory place to stay.

The people may be assured that the Apache will be built just as announced and undoubtedly according to the plans which have been prepared by a prominent firm of hotel architects. Those who are directly responsible for the success of this great enterprise and which means so much to the prosperity of Phoenix, state that the financing has been entirely completed and that actual construction work will proceed as quickly as possible.

The new million-dollar hotel, the Apache, will be operated by the M. T. Grier Hotel company. M. T. Grier has successfully conducted the Castle Hot Springs hotel and other well-known hotels. Those who are responsible for the success of this enterprise include J. H. Christian, S. J. Buckingham, Jordan, Grace and Phelps Land company, the banks of Phoenix, Rotary and Kiwanis clubs and the chamber of commerce.

ESTATE OF GAMBLER WHO WAS KILLED IS FILED IN COURT

An inventory and appraisal of the estate of Harry Creme, filed yesterday with the clerk of the superior court by Benjamin A. Funk, Eddie Moore and W. R. Ingraham, the appraisers, showed that the boss gambler was worth \$2,116.54 on August 18, the day he was shot and killed by Nick Rigles in front of the Athenian club in Wall street alley.

A Dodge touring car and \$700.79 cash constituted the bulk of this property, but numerous smaller items, emblematical of Creme's profession, were

listed in the inventory filed yesterday. "Ten card tables, \$15," ran the list, and there were ten cuspidors and 31 chairs to match. Two electric fans, an ice chest and a water cooler were also included among Creme's possessions.

Creme also had a diamond pin valued at \$300, and an insurance policy the value of which is unknown. He had 500 shares of Superstition Consolidated stock, appraised at \$15. A pair of boxing gloves completed the list.

U. S. MARINES SHOW AT THE STATE FAIR

The United States marine corps is going to be represented at the state fair, according to Major J. C. Fegan, who was in Phoenix yesterday on his tour of this recruiting district.

It is the intention of the marines to be well-represented by an exhibit worthy of the reputation of the branch of the service. Major Fegan stated yesterday that he intended sending a man from Los Angeles with a motorcycle exhibit, in addition to which a large exhibit would come from the east.

In the articles coming from the east will be included a set of the new uniforms now being worn by the marines, and a completed kit as used by each enlisted man of the corps. There will also be a number of pictures from

France showing the use to which the French are putting the old American barracks and equipment.

Major Fegan stated yesterday that recruiting for the marines in this district has picked up considerably since his last visit five weeks ago, and that he expected quite a number of recruits to enlist after having seen the fair exhibit.
