## MAN WHO WAS GASSED AND WOUNDED WILL BE IN METHODIST PULPIT

Ben Scovell, entertainer and lecturer, who will give a series of recitals in Phoenix, will occupy the pulpit of the First Methodist church Sunday evening, when he will take for his subject, "Christ in the Trenches." With a striking personality, coupled with a vast amount of first-hand information and experience, Mr. Scovell should attract an unusually large gathering. Many Phoenixians may recall having seen Scovell on the stage in the east a few years ago when he appeared in the support of a number of famous stars. A nephew of Sir Henry Irving, he was with the great actor at the time of his death.

Later he devoted his time to entertainment in the American soldier camps, and still later went abroad, serving for months as an entertainer on the other side, where he encountered many dangers. Gassed and wounded many times, and only recently recovered from shell shock, Scovell knows of that which he speaks in his lecture of the war. One of his particularly fine lectures, "Dodging Shrapnel in France," will be delivered here on Tuesday night, when he will appear at the Trinity Pro-Cathedral.

There is no question but that Scovell performed fine work in France. Among the many who appreciated what he did over there was Robert Service, a former friend and comrade who gave his life to his country.

The famous poet in a letter to Scovell wrote as follows:  
Etampes, France, Jan. 4, 1917.  
No. 1 Canadian Military Hospital,  
B. E. F.  
Mr. Ben Scovell,

Toronto, Canada.  
My Dear Mr. Scovell:  
You have my full permission to use my books of poems. You are doing a work among the soldiers, especially among the sick and wounded, that money cannot buy and only God can direct. I hope you will have the strength and courage to continue the good fight in carrying sunshine and laughter to our brave boys. Drop me a line whenever you can. Believe me ever yours,  
Robert W. Service.

## BILL WOULD MAKE THE 'CLOSED SHOP' ILLEGAL IN ALABAMA

It became known yesterday that a bill against the closed shop had been introduced into the legislature of Alabama and had been reported favorably for passage. The introduction of such a measure, according to comment promulgated by the league for industrial rights, is considered an excellent way to debate the Americanism of the closed shop.

The bill would prohibit and punish employer and employee for discrimination against each other and against laborers not members of a union or labor organization and against the state of Alabama and the products of the state of Alabama. It continues thus:

"Any person, firm or corporation occupying the position of employer of labor to discharge, suspend or transfer or reduce the wages of any employee or other person in the service thereof because such employee or other person is a member of a labor union or other labor organization, and any employee or other person engaged in work or service for any person, firm or corporation who shall form a conspiracy or quit his or her work or employment by reason of the employment of such person, firm or corporation of

any other person or persons who may not be a member of a labor union or who may not conform to fixed standards or requirements of organized labor shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

"That any labor union, organization or any committee or individual member thereof who shall interfere with, or undertake to interfere with, or shall influence or endeavor to influence by threats or intimidation or other means any non-union labor or others from engaging in any other labor or employment that they may desire, or who after any members of their unions or organizations have abandoned or quit work or service shall by threats, or intimidation or other means under-

take to interfere with or embarrass their firm or employer or any other person engaged in like business or who shall by threats, intimidation or other means prevent or endeavor to prevent what are known as non-union labor from engaging in work, or in filling places which may have been abandoned by them shall be guilty of a

misdemeanor. "That any labor unions or labor organizations who boycott or endeavor to boycott any non-union labor in the state of Alabama or any of the products of the state of Alabama by forcing or endeavoring to force what is commonly called a 'closed shop' by threats or intimidations or other means against anyone, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.


"That any employer who, by its officers or directors or agents, or by any labor union or labor organization or committees or any individual members thereof who violates any of the provisions of this act, shall on conviction be fined not less than \$100 and not more than \$1,000 and may also be imprisoned in the county jail or sentenced to hard labor for the county not to exceed 12 months.

"Should any section of this bill be declared unconstitutional, it shall not affect any other section of this bill. The provisions of this act shall be effective 30 days after approval by the government."
