Nine hundred thousand women of France were thrown out of employment at the signing of the armistice. While there will be work enough for all in reconstructing the industrial and economic life of France...

Many of these women are widowed, many of them have been cut off from the privilege of marrying, and many have heavy responsibilities thrust on them in supporting relatives.

So appreciated has been the association's work in other countries that in France a public holiday was declared on the occasion of a visiting secretary and school children lined up in the streets to cheer her.

In Vladivostok, the Y. W. C. A. served Russians, Czechs, Chinese, Red Cross nurses and other Americans. Conditions in Poland, due to lack of food, clothes, medical aid and hospitals, are described in a cablegram received at headquarters...

NO "LOOSE ROCK" IN SPECIFICATIONS FOR COUNTY HIGHWAYS

Concerning the subject of specifications which have been submitted by the county highway commission for contractors, the commission stated yesterday that there was misunderstanding and a misstatement regarding the so-called "loose rock" specifications.

As to the statement of District Engineer Bright of the bureau of good roads, telegraphed in reply to an inquiry by the state engineer, that the government would not extend federal aid to any project whose specifications were not approved by the bureau and that the bureau had not approved loose rock specifications, the commission stated that that had nothing to do with any specifications which the commission has adopted.

In proof of the statement that the specifications which have been understood to be loose rock specifications are not, the commission states that the specifications are precisely the same in language and form as those which had been approved by the government for road work in North Carolina.

WOMEN HAVE POWER TO REDUCE LIVING COST, SAYS AGENT

Not until women unite in demanding lower prices will prices be forced down, declared Miss Flossie Wilds, home demonstration agent for Maricopa county, in an address on thrift before the Woman's club yesterday afternoon.

Salary increases to meet exorbitant prices asked by merchants and grocers do not solve the problem, she said, urging the women to follow the advice of Attorney General Palmer, whose slogan is, "Don't buy."

Miss Wilds advised her hearers, among them who were many well-dressed women, to select their costumes for length of service as well as appearance, and to avoid fads.
