

# SPRING TERM OF FEDERAL COURT IS BUSY SESSION

## Grand Jury Is Sworn In And Starts Its Work—Many Important Cases To Be Considered—Judge Dyer On Bench

The special spring term of federal court convened at 10 o'clock yesterday morning, Judge David P. Dyer of Missouri, presiding. While a number of preliminary matters were disposed of and the federal grand jury sworn in for duty, a number of important motions set for the opening day were continued. Among the number was the case of the government versus A. J. Peters and others on the charge of conspiracy to defraud, the argument of the demurrers having gone over until March 9. On the same day the demurrers will be heard in the million-dollar libel suit brought by Samuel C. Pandolfo versus the Bank of Benson. Judge Dyer announced that while he was delighted to be in Arizona, it was not altogether a pleasure trip that brought him here. He was here for business. He made it understood that he meant to dispatch all court matters as quickly as possible, announcing the court hours as 10 until 12 o'clock, when a two-hour recess will be taken, and from 2 until 4 or 4:30 o'clock.

While the grand jury has been sworn in, the trial jury will not be called until next Tuesday.

**May Last Two Months**

The first case set for hearing before Judge Dyer is that of Riley Smauling, charged with contempt of court, which comes up today. The defendant is charged with violation of an injunction in which he was ordered to keep his livestock off of the national forest. Smauling will be represented by M. J. Phelps.

It is believed that court will be in session here for fully two months, although J. H. Langston, assistant United States attorney, who is conducting the investigation of the grand jury, is of the opinion there will be few new criminal cases. He said yesterday he thought it more than likely the jury would complete its work in three or four days, when afternoon recess was taken yesterday some half dozen cases had been disposed of. There are 15 cases set for presentation, said Langston, who is eager that the matter be fully represented, but that the jury do its work in the shortest possible time.

**Orders Special Venue**

Thomas A. Flynn, United States attorney, filed an information charging Harold Steele with cutting timber on the Cocouino national forest. The government officials have been advised that Steele will file a written plea of guilty to the misdemeanor in court this morning.

Mr. Flynn also filed an application for a writ of habeas corpus for prisoners now being held in Prescott who are wanted here as witnesses before the grand jury. The writ was issued by the court, and the prisoners will be brought to Phoenix to appear before the jurors, who include Martin Weyant, foreman; Harry Bennett, C. D. Boyce, Richard Hogsett, Oscar Irwin, J. Arthur, C. M. Donahoe, T. H. Higley, Frank Staples, J. T. Rogers, J. C. Sutter, J. E. Hunsaker, A. B. Baker, Rolly Weigold, N. D. Biedgett, John J. Cresop, C. C. Cruz and J. S. Loe.

When the jury was called yesterday morning only 12 responded and the court ordered a special venire. The marshal served the necessary additional number during the noon recess. Only one of the number asked to be excused, George W. Burgess stating that he was on the Pinal county highway commission, and in recognition of the public service rendered by Burgess the court granted the excuse.

**Call Criminal Calendar March 2**

Judge Dyer advised the jury to observe the regulation office hours for their investigations. He charged them not to allow their personal likes or dislikes to influence their actions, as he emphasized the importance of the work before the jury.

He informed the United States attorneys that the cases where men are in jail awaiting trial should be taken up first, although no date as yet has been set for criminal cases. The criminal calendar, it is understood, will be called on March 2.

At the conclusion of an informal address to the bar, Judge Dyer gave his attention to motions set for hearing. A number of motions were made for settlement of cases. The suit on contract for damages brought by Copper Buttes Mines versus Frank C. Armstrong for \$40,000, was settled for \$10,000. The \$2,000 action instituted by Rosa Caesare against the Pullman Car company was settled for a nominal sum. Anthony Caesare, a husband of the plaintiff, was a party to the suit which grew out of the purchase of a Pullman ticket from Los Angeles to Phoenix. It was alleged the ticket was issued for a wrong date, and the plaintiff, in ill-health, was compelled to sit in the day coach. The \$5,000 damage suit of Isaac Cvijanovich against the Ray Consolidated Copper company was also settled out of court.

**Most Interest in Hay Case**

After the actions were dismissed the court continued the important demurrers in the cases which are of greatest interest during the present court term—that of the Tempe merchant who sold the government hay which he is alleged to have misrepresented in respect to its grade. Charged with A. J. Peters as defendants, are his son, Vernon Peters, J. N. Jagers, who was a hay inspector, and Clifford Smith and Paul O. Aepil, who were in Peters' employ at the time the alleged sale was made.

In the Pandolfo case practically every bank in the state is a defendant, the action being brought against the Arizona Bankers' association. The suit is based on the publication of the secretary's report of the association, including a resolution with reference to Pandolfo. Pandolfo recently was convicted in the federal court of having used the mails to defraud. He is the head of the Pan-Motor company of Indianapolis.

Both the million-dollar libel suit and the Peters case were set for trial on March 9, the day on which the demurrers will be argued.

**Recovers from Flu**


Raymond Dyer is again at his work as secretary of the commercial club after about a week's tussle with the flu.
