AGAIN TAKE HINDU ON MURDER CHARGE

Holding that a charge of murder in the first degree is not subject to bond, County Attorney Lane appeared before Judge R. C. Stanford of the superior court yesterday morning asking that a bench warrant be issued for Mahr Singh (Peter Martin). The warrant was issued and Mahr Singh is now in jail again. A hearing of the warrant will be had this morning.

Mahr Singh with Harnam Singh, was held to answer to the superior court on a charge of the murder of Ruben Cervantes, a 17-year-old Mexican boy, at their ranch house south of Chandler last April. Their bonds were placed at \$25,000 each, and recently Mahr Singh was released on the bond of a bank to whom he had paid the amount, it is alleged.

Cervantes, it was shown in a brother-in-law of Mahr Singh. The body was supposed to have been buried near the Singh ranch house in a lime grave and only small portions were found by the officers. A ring identified as the property of Cervantes was found in the grave with portions of bone and garments. Mahr Singh explained the absence of Cervantes by stating that he was in Los Angeles.

PRESSMEN TO STAND BY THEIR CONTRACTS

At a regular meeting of Phoenix Printing Pressmen's Union Tuesday evening a resolution was adopted declaring the intention of that organization to live up to their contracts to the letter with the publishers of Phoenix in the future as they have, always in the past.

SUES FOR OPEN DITCH—Declaring that he will be damaged to the extent of \$500 if he does not get water on his land through an irrigation ditch on the land of another, M. Oxford filed suit in the superior court yesterday against Robert Bowen asking that a temporary injunction be issued immediately to restrain the defendant from interfering with the ditch or ditch site. Oxford alleges that the right to maintain the ditch was given by Bowen and his predecessors many years ago and that the right still exists. He further alleges that about two weeks ago Bowen filled up the ditch thereby depriving him of water for the coming season of 1920.

SENTENCED TO PRISON—Harry Moore, whose true name is said to be William A. Todd, was sentenced yesterday by Judge R. C. Stanford of the superior court to serve not less than three nor more than five years in the state prison at Florence. He was taken to Florence by Deputy Gilbert Blanco soon after sentence had been passed.
