

## WOMAN'S CLUB IN JOINT PROGRAM SEASON'S EVENT

Mrs. F. A. Seiberling's Singing and Her Plea to Make America World's Music Center Afternoon Feature

Accomplishing its purpose in creating a fine feeling of good fellowship and understanding between the different city clubs, the program presented by the Woman's club yesterday in which each one of the city organizations furnished a number was a decided success.

Mrs. James Griffin, president of the Woman's club, in a brief talk before the formal opening of the program, stated that she hoped the program of the day would be the initial annual event, and her hope was echoed by the largest gathering of clubwomen held in Phoenix this winter.

It was especially pleasing to the clubs to have as guest Mrs. F. A. Seiberling, president of the National Federation of Musical Clubs, who is passing the spring season at Chandler. Mrs. Seiberling represented the Sunday Musical club on the program, singing a group of songs delightfully. She sang, "Break, Break, Break" and "The Woodpecker," her beautiful soprano voice contributing largely to the afternoon's enjoyment. She also led the community singing which followed her plea to the club women to assist in making America the musical center of the world.

**For Music in Schools**  
Mrs. Seiberling, after extending greetings from the national federation of 200,000 members, which she heads, stated that its object was to become truly national—to take music to every nook and corner of the United States. She declared that music was not for the privileged few, but a great God-given thing for the joy and gratification of all. She appealed to the club women to get behind the movement of better music in the schools, making it a credited course here as elsewhere. She urged the local music lovers to help the aspiring artist and develop talent in our own country.

A state festival of musical clubs was advocated by Mrs. Seiberling, who said that she hoped to be in attendance at such an event in Phoenix next winter.

A number of more than ordinary merit and interest was presented by the hostess club, Mrs. Henry D. Ross, contributing a bit of original verse which she interpreted with her usual cleverness. Mrs. Ross has a keen sense of humor with which her verse, "A Modern Tournament," is not lacking. The clever lines reveal the conflict of the modern woman, showing the things she would do and that which she must do.

**Each Club Represented**  
Clearly outlining the objects of the Business and Professional Woman's club, Miss Alice Hine gave a brief history of the organization and the place it was filling in clubdom. The development of the organization in the past few months was pointed out by the speaker.

Mrs. Loring Lennox told of the work being accomplished by the Pan Hellenic association and of the social work which will be the aim of the local club of the same name.

The College club contributed an exceptionally attractive number, Mrs. Francis H. Redwill singing a group of Russian songs and Miss Margaret May Hurley executing a Russian dance in costume. The club is making a study of Russia this season and could not have brought their topic more delightfully to the attention of the clubs than by the artists they chose to represent them.

Miss Anna Marie Luke opened the program with a song. Her number, "The Swallow," was received with the enthusiasm that is always apparent when Miss Luke appears on a program. She appeared for the Harmony club.

The Friday club also gave a feature number, Miss Jane Christy and Miss Louise Connor giving a Spanish dance. The pretty school girls wore the becoming black and scarlet costume of the Spanish dancer and were charmingly attractive.

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## PLAN BIG RECEPTION TO C. OF C. EXCURSION IN CITIES ON BORDER

The greatest peace pipe in the history of the world, guaranteed to make eternal friendship of men whenever or wherever they scent the aroma thereof, will disperse smoke everywhere during the Borderland excursion of the Phoenix chamber of com-

merce April 7 to 10. Huge smoke clouds of a pre-excursion nature have already settled over Prescott and in an overwhelming whirlwind of delight that city is packing up and making ready to join Phoenix for the trip to the border via Tucson.

The great good fellowship excursion will be escorted by the Indian school band, which will symbolize the pipe. Where there is a man, a cactus or anything that wants to get acquainted, he will have an opportunity of a puff. This pipe contains a mixture the nature of which no chemist ever has been able to determine. It has a lifting effect, a touching effect and a rippling effect, but is not of the knock-down and drag-out variety.

At the council yesterday of the Borderland excursion committee the members listened to glowing letters from border cities, and to telegrams, asking them to hurry along with the smoke; that the aroma of eternal friendship already had reached them. The committee decided to write each commercial organization in the valley confirming a verbal invitation to send a delegation on the excursion.

The commander-in-chief of uniforms and equipment was appointed in the person of Roy Murray. The secretary was instructed to furnish the badges. Harry Trittle, C. E. Beach and John Lyder were appointed as the committee on tickets. A. C. Taylor was named to look after advertisement features. It was decided that the cost price of tickets would be \$65. This will include railroad fare, sleeper accommodations, uniform, badge and sundries, but not meals. The first stop will be Casa Grande, then Tucson, Bisbee, Douglas and Nogales.
