**AFTER LONG SEARCH MESA MAN FINDS SON IN HOSPITAL**

MESA, July 20.—After weeks of anxious and seemingly fruitless searching along the entire railway route from Roblinette, Oregon, to this point, in an effort to locate his son who was last seen or heard of at Roblinette on May 24, J. H. Thomas, Mesa resident living on the Chandler road just south of town, last week located the missing man at San Bernardino, California.

Taylor Thomas, who is 46 years old, last spring was afflicted with attacks of influenza and small pox, and as soon as he had recovered sufficiently he started from his home near Roblinette, Oregon, for Mesa, where he intended to live with his parents. More than a month later, the parents here upon learning that he had started for Arizona became anxious as to his whereabouts.

The father, J. H. Thomas, left at once for Oregon, but inquiry there revealed nothing beyond the fact that the son had departed on May 24 for this point. Railroad officials seemingly could not trace his travels down, but tentatively the father continued the search, and enlisting the aid of an old friend, a conductor on a short line, in Oregon, the inquiry was continued.

Meantime the old friend of the family had been working on the case and tracing Taylor Thomas' ticket down from conductor to conductor, he finally discovered that the man had left the train at San Bernardino. There the missing man was located last week in a hospital where he had been for more than a month and a half recovering from a sudden relapse in health suffered during the trip on the train.

"The father joined the son there last week and together they came on to the family home here where the sick man will remain for a complete recovery."

**Tribute Paid Honored Dead**  
High tribute was paid to the Mesa boys who made the supreme sacrifice in the world war, at the memorial service held here Sunday night under the auspices of the local post of the American Legion. More than 1,500 citizens of the town representing all denominations gathered at the union service conducted in the auditorium and listened with keenest interest to the short addresses that were made in commemoration of the second anniversary of America's first offensive on the European battlefield, and in memory to the six Mesa boys who sacrificed their lives that night might prevail.

Judge Henry D. Ross of the Arizona supreme court, Rev. W. C. Miller of the Mesa Methodist church and Major L. M. McKinley of Phoenix, addressed the gathering paying due honor to all of America's soldiers who lost their lives in the great conflict. Major McKinley in presenting the French Memorial certificates to a relative of each deceased Mesa soldier, recounted how America had entered the war when the darkest hours overhung the allied forces then on the battlefield, and how her men and arms finally meant victory to the allied cause.

The memorial certificates given by the French republic were presented to relatives of the following fallen soldiers: Marion E. Rodgers, headquarters company, 15th Infantry; Henry H. Rithrock, 19th Aero squadron; William H. Clark, Company A, U. S. guards; Joseph St. Morris, Battery C, 54th P. A.; Allan B. Newberry, Company B, 35th Infantry; Jack Melrose, Company G, 6th Marines.

**Expresses Regret Cannot Attend**

Marshall, commanding officer of the 1st Cavalry Division, that he was unable to attend the funeral of his son, Private Francis C.
