

STATE LANDS MUST BE RESERVED FOR PEOPLE-CAMPBELL

(Special to The Republican)
 WINSLOW, Ariz., Oct. 2.—"If Arizona is ever to become a great state in comparison with her sister states she must bring into being opportunities for homes for the people," declared Governor Campbell in his address last night, "and reclamation, together with the people's heritage, the state lands, offers the opportunity for just that." He added, "But the state lands must be administered in half of all the people and not just a chosen few," he declared, "if the desert and its to be brought about. The people have lost confidence in the present land board," said the governor, "and are demanding a change in order that all may have an equal opportunity share in the opportunities offered by just, sound and efficient administration of the state lands."

"So much criticism has been voiced against the land commissioner," declared Governor Campbell, "that only a short time ago no less than three democratic members of the land board demanded the resignation of that commissioner and then weakened for political reasons and continued him in office."

Discussing reclamation, Governor Campbell declared that as president of a League of the Southwest he and other western governors went to Washington, where they found reclamation a dead issue, and by dint of hard work revived it to the extent that both political parties incorporated reclamation planks in their platforms, and Senator Harding personally promised that if elected president he would foster reclamation and conservation, even as did Roosevelt.

Referring to the Colorado river project, which would reclaim some 1,750,000 acres in Arizona alone, the speaker declared that 50,000,000 gallons of water per minute were now flowing wastefully to the sea in that stream. If the Little Colorado river project, which would reclaim 50,000 acres around Winslow, he said the estimated cost was \$4,000,000, which would create and value of \$20,000,000 and annually enable agricultural products worth hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Touching upon the state lands as at present administered, Governor Campbell said the state was spending two and a half times as much money for vocational education alone as the state lands brought in rentals per annum. Governor Campbell said: "Seven hundred and fifty thousand of the very best acres of this land has been sold at an average price of \$5 1/2 dollars per acre, 13,000 acres of which, in the Salt River valley are worth several hundred thousand dollars today. Most of this vast heritage is now being rented in great part to a few little outfits, which pay only about one-eighth of what they would have to pay in taxes and interest on the land if they owned it."

"Your heritage is being dissipated," said Governor Campbell, "and this must stop if you and your children, our returned soldiers and the people who come to Arizona as the land of opportunities, are to have an opportunity of sharing in the benefits of this great heritage."

Governor Campbell and party leave Sunday morning for Springfield, going to Holbrook Monday and Flagstaff Tuesday for meetings, after which the governor will return to Phoenix for a day.

He Has Made All Detroit Like His Chili






Gov. Cox Says Associated Press Honest In Report

 KANSAS CITY, Oct. 2.—Governor Cox of Ohio, Democratic presidential nominee, tonight issued the following statement:

"My attention has just been called to a syndicated article by William Howard Taft in which he makes the misstatement that I have attacked the Associated Press for failing to give to the American public a 'fair account' of my speeches and phases of my campaign. This would appear to be a part of the deliberate conspiracy on the part of reactionary politicians, and one to which I am loath to believe Mr. Taft would knowingly lend his name.

"Upon reaching the coast we found that not only was the reactionary press refusing to carry advance news of meetings, but affidavits of Republican editors established the fact that scouts of the Republican organization were demanding of the so-called Republican press silence regarding the meetings and a suppression of the facts after the meetings.

"In bringing these matters to the attention of my audiences, I several times made the statement that the Associated Press and other press organizations had representatives in my party; that they all were carrying the news, but that reactionary editors were failing to give their dispatches to the public.
