### SET DATE FOR SALE OF CITY BOND ISSUES

January 15 was set by the city commission yesterday as the date for the sale of the bonds voted by taxpayers of Phoenix at the special election Nov. 27. The bonds are the three issues which carried, of the seven proposed, and are in amounts of \$450,000, \$140,000 and \$45,000. In the ordinance adopted by the commission, which has an emergency clause, it is specified that sealed proposals for the purchase of the bonds will be received by the commission Jan. 12.

The time for payment of the first installment of city taxes was extended to Jan. 3 by the commission, on recommendation of City Assessor Trevillian. An ordinance also was adopted prohibiting the erection of tent houses, tents and similar structures within the city limits.

### FEW FAILED TO PAY INCOME TAX HERE

Income tax returns, as compiled in the office of the internal revenue collector, show Phoenix and Arizona to be in an unusually healthy financial condition. These returns show that less than five per cent of the total number of taxpayers had failed to

meet their government obligations before delinquency yesterday.

Wednesday was the final date for paying income taxes and those who did not comply with the regulations must now pay the delinquency fee, amounting to five per cent of the whole, and one per cent a month for each month the taxes are unpaid.

The percentage of delinquents in this state, it is estimated, will be lower than that of any other state in this section of the country. The delinquent roll in Arizona is exclusive of protests and taxes under adjustment.

Warrants for distraint will be issued by the government within the next 20 days. This action constitutes a lien against property of the assessed. The five per cent delinquency fee will not be collected until the expiration of a 10-day notice, to be given by the collector of internal revenue.

### H. M. MORITZ TO BE DEPUTY EXAMINER

H. M. Moritz of Holbrook will be deputy state bank examiner after the first of the year, according to the announcement made yesterday by Charles Fairfield, auditor-elect. The Navajo county man has had several years banking experience, having been connected with New Mexico institutions before going to Holbrook, where for three years he has been associated with the Merchants and Stockgrowers bank.

Mr. Fairfield recently appointed E. C. Bradford of Douglas as state bank examiner. Another appointment announced at the state house yesterday was that of R. W. Pierce, who will serve as assistant state examiner after the new year and who at present is assisting Mr. Fairfield in preparing the budget. J. C. Durey, the present assistant, will be deputy state auditor.
