"This character of membership is much to be desired. It is a valuable asset to our organization, and we especially urge you to be on the lookout for, and invite such membership whenever possible. You may have some personal friends in some of our outlying districts, who would be most happy to become a part of this interesting organization, just for the interesting literature and the pleasant communications the mail would bring them. On the other hand they mean much to us as a connecting link in the chain of musical interest in this vast and sparsely settled state, and might become in the future the possible start for a music club when their particular community develops sufficiently for such an organization."

Organization Methods
"So many communications have come to us regarding the procedure necessary or advisable in the organization of clubs we deem it expedient to offer suggestions and instructions along that line."
"First, we would say: Before planning the organization of a distinctly musical club in your locality be perfectly sure there is a need for the same, and sufficient talent and interest to assure its life and growth. If your town has a well organized woman's club with a music department, it might be wise to urge the federation of this department and concentrate the musical activities of the community there rather than to burden the residents with another organization. This would also tend to strengthen the woman's club, since every one who joined the department would first need to become a member of the woman's club. After a careful survey you decide to organize a music club, we offer the following instructions."
"Get a manual of the National Federation of Musical clubs, and follow closely the details of administration, dues, meetings. Since member-

Sliced Pineapple
Ginger Cookies

Quick Parker House Rolls
All measurements are level
3 cupsful flour; ½ teaspoonful salt; 3 teaspoonfuls Schilling Baking Powder; ½ tablespoonful sugar; ¼ cupful shortening; 1 egg well beaten; ¼ cupful milk.

Sift together the dry ingredients and work in the shortening, which should be softened, with a spoon. Add the egg and milk combined, toss onto a floured board, roll to one-third inch in thickness and shape into rounds. Crease each one half way through, brush with melted butter, fold over and bake about twenty-five minutes in a quick oven. Can be eaten hot or cold.
