


SCENES FROM PUEBLO SHOWING FLOOD DAMAGE

TRAP GUN AND ROD

Yet, no apparent effort is being made by accredited officers, to enforce our drastic prohibition laws.

Ducks and geese are millitarristic during their migratory flights. They form into an aerial cavalcade, single file or in V shaped formation. An acknowledged leader sets the pace and guides. His every turn or movement is simultaneously executed by the balance of the flock. He is commanding officer, appointing his outer guards and sentinels, who in turn are responsible, during the period of feeding or rest for flock safety. Migrating ducks, when traveling, prefer an altitude of approximately 1,800 yards, flying at an average speed of about 68 miles per hour, this estimated by observing aviators. Powerful vision and innate sense of direction, enables birds to follow the same course annually, religiously returning later to their original breeding grounds. An identification system has been inaugurated. An aluminum band, numbered and registered is fastened around the young bird's leg. Sportsmen killing a banded bird should immediately report in detail to United States department of agriculture, Washington, D. C., who are compiling an interesting and instructive line of statistics on habits and flight of migratory birds.

Marshall's Answers to Nimrod's Q. What were the scores made by the different countries in the Antwerp games at Antwerp, Belgium, in 1920? As I understand the teams were composed of six men each. A. Eight countries entered for competition at the Antwerp, Olympic games. Holland, Norway and France withdrew from the contest, owing to the shooting made in the first 300 targets shot at. The contest was six men from each country to constitute a team. Shooting at 100 targets each, the aggregate would be 600 for each team entered. The individual world championship was won by Mark Arle of Chicago, Ill., with a score of 95 in a possible 100.
