CHARLIE WHITE BATTLED HIS WAY FROM COT OF INVALID TO ONE SECOND OF CHAMPIONSHIP

From an invalid's bed to within one second of the world's lightweight championship is some step and proves that boxing is a body builder that can successfully combat the white plague, yet that is what Charlie White accomplished in his 12 years of fighting.

Charlie Anichowitz, known to boxing fans as Charlie White, was born in Liverpool, England, in 1891. His parents came to this country when he was very young and Charlie grew to manhood in the Chicago tenement district, where he became afflicted with tuberculosis.

Physicians who attended the young man advised a trip to Colorado, but Charlie's parents were not over-supplied with the world's goods and he took to physical culture to regain his lost health. When he first started gym work Charlie was hardly able to carry a medicine ball, but a course in training soon rebuilt the broken frame and young Anichowitz became expert in gymnasium boxing. He

his seconds were slow to take advantage of the act which could have disqualified Benny.

In 1916 White lost a 20-round decision to Freddie Welsh for the lightweight title. Ringside observers state White outboxed the champion in practically every round, but in those days champions were given the benefit of the doubt on close decisions.

Low Tandler has steered clear of White for several years, though claiming the right to meet Leonard White and Tandler are signed to fight in Madison Square Garden the latter part of next month.

White defeated Johnny Griffiths, a good welterweight, and lost a 12-round decision to Champion Jack Britton. He has defeated Ad Wolgast, Ritchie Mitchell, Jimmy Duffey, Matt Wells, Leach Cross, Ted Lewis, Johnny Dundee, Stanley Younum, Joe Azavedo, Danny O'Brien and over 150 other well known boxers.

In signing White for a Phoenix bout, Matchmaker Jake Ehrhardt received his agreement to meet any legitimate lightweight in the world without any restrictions except that his opponent must weigh in at 135 pounds.

When White meets Freddie Hill at the Eighth street arena next Thursday afternoon, Phoenix fight fans will see the best lightweight in the game outside of Champion Leonard. Hill is taking a long chance on fighting White, but if he beats the Chicago boy he is made and the checks will flow through the box office like a circus parade.

Four preliminary bouts will usher in the main go with Red Gardner and Mack Spaw in a six-round semi-final.

Tickets are on sale at Eddie Doyle's cigar stand.

Both men should be in the city today ready for public workouts at the Eighth street arena.

GIANTS AND SOX MEET TODAY AT EASTLAKE PARK

PHOENIX PLAYER STARS IN COAST GRIDIRON GAME

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Nov. 19—The University of California eleven dedicated Stanford's new stadium with a 42 to 7 victory over the fighting Cardinals this afternoon before a crowd that was estimated at close to 60,000.

Stanford scored first within three minutes after the kick off by recovering California's fumble and bucking over for a touchdown.

The Stanford rooters went wild with excitement when the Cardinals crossed California's line.

California evened the score in the first quarter by a series of line plays after a favorable exchange of kicks.

California did not show the much touted "wonder team" in the initial quarter fumbling on several occasions.

After Brick Muller went in in the middle of the second quarter California showed more fight and put across two touchdowns, the half ending 21-7.

Forrest "Red" Betts of Phoenix and veteran of Stanford's great team of two years ago went in during the second quarter and played a brilliant game.

Stanford's line, although outweighing California by some pounds, could not class with the blue and gold.

California's line broke through repeatedly to break up plays, nullifying the Cardinal kicker before he could get rid of the ball. The Bears showed more polish at every angle and their team work was excellent.

Muller failed to complete a single forward pass out of many attempted during the game.

Harvard Eleven Upsets Dope By Defeating Yale

O'Hearn was thrown 4 yards from his own goal line. After the three Yale plays had gained 4 yards, Aldrich punted and Buell made a fair catch on Yale's 43 yard line.

Owen again failed in an attempt to kick a goal from place. Yale put the ball in play again on its own 20-yard line. Two Yale plays failed to gain and Aldrich punted to Harvard's 45-yard line. O'Hearn's forward pass was incomplete and a line plunge was stopped, so Fitts bunted. The ball went out of bounds on Yale's 23 yard line. Chaplin replaced Coburn as fullback for Harvard. Jordan circled end for a 15-yard gain. Three more Yale plays were smothered and O'Hearn punted to Buell on Harvard's 24-yard line. Harvard made first down at its own 35-yard line. After Owen, who carried it but gained twenty-five yards more, Jordan intercepted Buell's forward pass at mid-field and was tackled there by Macomber.

Their Period

At the opening of the third period Cross replaced Guernsey at guard for Yale. Aldrich of Yale kicked off to Harvard's battery. Line and Owen ran the ball back 15 yards. After an exchange of punts a forward pass from Fitts to Chaplin, gained nine yards and Owen made it first down on Yale's 47 yard line. One line plunge and two forward passes were without result for the Crimson. Fitts punted to Yale's 17-yard line. In five plays, Yale earned two first downs and put the ball on its own forty yard line, largely as the result of runs by Jordan and Aldrich.

After one short end run by Aldrich, Jordan in two line smashes put the ball 44 yards from place. Owen. After Jordan had smashed his way through the Crimson line for nine yards more, Captain Kane of Harvard was hurt and LaDra replaced him. A short plunge by Mallory and an offside penalty imposed on Harvard, gave Yale a first down on the Crimson 28-yard line.

Yale 2; Harvard 0.

With Yale leading, 3 to 0, the game turned in the third period on Buell's feat in running back, through most of the Yale team, a punt which he caught at midfield. His dash caused 32 yards, carrying the ball to Yale's 12-yard line.

Fourth Period

Opening the fourth period Buell advanced eight yards through a delayed forward pass. A burst against the Blue line lacked inches of first down. Owen gathered strength for another assault and carried not only the down but the goal, plunging over the Yale forwards.
