ON LIQUOR CHARGE—R. H. Johanning, a plumber, who was arrested Saturday evening in connection with the town dance palace by Officers Dean and Sheehy of the city police department for alleged violation of the liquor laws, was bound over to the federal grand jury yesterday by John B. Henke, United States commissioner. His bond was set at \$500. Johanning, who is charged with the possession and transportation of intoxicants in violation of the national prohibition amendment, is said to have had a gallon of white wine in a Ford truck, with four short quarts of the same concoction near the machine, while a number of broken bottles in the car were taken as evidence that he had tried to destroy some of his stock in trade before being arrested. The truck was seized by M. E. Cassidy, state prohibition director, and will be held pending the outcome of the charges assessed against Johanning before the grand jury.

NEW CORPORATIONS—Three companies were incorporated under the laws of this state yesterday, among which was the W. C. Ellis Building company. The incorporators were named as W. C. Ellis, Reba Ellis and M. T. Phelps and the capital stock given as \$1,000,000 divided in 10,000 shares at the par value of \$100 each. The Associated Gold Mines of Arizona filed its articles of incorporation with the corporation commission naming Joseph L. Dillon, United States marshal, as president, Leslie Holman, vice president and Gilmore Goodland, secretary. Its authorized capitalization is \$100,000. The third company to incorporate was the Katherine Sunbeam Mining company of Nevada with a capital stock of \$150,000 divided into 1,500,000 shares at 10 cents par.






