A RAILROAD TO LAND.

Circumstances favorable to direct rail connection with the coast.

W. F. Powers, with the Wells-Fargo Express company, at Albuquerque, accompanied by Mr. Conrad, traveling auditor of the Santa Fe railway, were in town Wednesday, after having made a trip to the Coast district. These gentlemen are close observers of the prospects of the land mines and of the advantages of Cerrillos as a smelting center.

After having thoroughly canvassed the situation, they are of the opinion that the Santa Fe company, if some encouragement were offered, might be induced to extend its line from Cerrillos to Bland. They affirm that the people of Bland recognize the advantages of rail connection with Cerrillos, as they believe that most of the ore of that district might eventually be sent to market by this route. For this and other reasons they would prefer that a line of road be extended from Cerrillos to Bland.

Said to be the leader of a gang on the Yaqui.

A correspondent of the Phoenix, Arizona Republic, who claims to have spent considerable time in Mexico, says Apache Kid is not dead. In a lengthy article he says in part:

"There is supposed to exist a desperate gang in the Sierra Madre mountains on the upper tributaries of the Yaqui river. It is composed of renegade Apache Indians and American fugitives and criminals. They rarely ever venture out of the deep mountain canyons. A rifle or a small grub pack is sufficient prize for the desperado. They have never been known to hold up men. They always kill, and in the most cowardly manner—from the protection of a clump of brush or the generous body of a tree. Apache Kid is one of the leaders of the gang."

The Arizo Land and Cattle company shipped four cars of cattle from this point the first part of the week.

Frank Wallace came down from the headquarters ranch of the Arizo Cattle company to spend a few days with his family until the weather settles.

The following named wool raisers, residents of this county, have sheep in the Salt River valley: Hart & Campbell, Cart & Noble, Scott Bros., Kinder & Burbage, J. E. Porter, William Morgan, Mr. Longmore, John Nelson, A. D. Schuster, Lorenzo Baca, J. D. Houck and Amos Ross.

Scott Bros., of Show Low, have carried off the banner for lambing this season. They had a band of 1,700 ewes in the Salt River valley that dropped 1,900 lambs. The lambs will be worth at least \$1.50 each this fall, and the wool from the ewes will more than pay the expense of running them. Sheep raising is a profitable industry.

Col. M. R. Tate met with quite a painful accident, while assisting in loading cattle. There was an outlaw steer in the corral which ran one of his horns through the colonel's right hand, between the third and little finger. Col. Tate is staying in town for a few days until the soreness has somewhat settled itself and the wound begins to heal.

A hunting party consisting of Mr. and Mrs. W. G. Tucker, Miss Lou Sherwood, Ed. Chandler and several other whose names we were unable to learn, left Thursday morning in the snow, fog and cold, for Hart & Campbell's ranch, on a hunting expedition in quest of mountain lions, bear, deer, antelope, turkey, or any other large game. They went well equipped with all the essentials to render camp life pleasant.

Mrs. M. M. Underwood, from Boston, Mass., mother of our popular conductor, E. P. Underwood, who was on her way to California with a party of friends to spend the winter, left the flyer at Albuquerque and came here to visit her son and his family. She remained two or three days, and while here insisted on having her grandson christened. There being no Episcopal minister here, Rev. Mr. Bartlett, of the Methodist Episcopal church, performed the christening ceremony. Thursday morning Mrs. Underwood, accompanied by her son, continued on her journey to California.

**FLAGSTAFF.**

The many friends of Prof. J. C. Wason, who is now in Phoenix, will learn with sorrow that he is in a very critical condition, and at last report he was not expected to live.

Mrs. Mary F. Matthews, widow of C. H. Matthews, who died in Albuquerque on last Tuesday from the effects of injuries received in the Johnson tunnel, returned to this town, accompanied by Mrs. Constock of Williams.

Deputy Sheriff F. Fairchild and Constable Bain Black returned from Tuba City where they had been to serve injunction papers on some Navajo Indians for erecting a dam across a stream of water which had been appropriated by some of the citizens of Tuba City.

W. F. Goodhue, of Chicago, has arrived and is at work developing water on the Beasley ranch. Messrs. Goodhue and Hinkley are the two gentlemen now having in charge the matter of developing a sufficient amount of water for supplying Flagstaff.

Several of our citizens were aroused from their slumbers by the alarm of fire. It was discovered to be in old town and the residence of J. H. Runney. Mr. Runney was sleeping in the front room and was awakened by the smoke. He rushed out and gave the alarm, but the fire was under great headway and it was impossible to save the building.

J. J. Smith, one of the gang who robbed the train at Canyon Diablo in this county a few years ago and was captured by "Bucky" O'Neill and posse, after a trial was sentenced to the penitentiary for twenty-five years. After serving about four years he was pardoned by ex-Governor Hughes on account of ill health. He has fully recovered his health and is now one of the most active members of Black Jack's gang. It is not good policy to pardon murderers and train robbers.

The Flagstaff Catholic Union met for the first time in their new hall last night, and the meeting was called to order by Rev. F. Dilly, who moved that Dr. Brannen act as chairman. The motion carried and Dr. Brannen took the chair. H. Mahoney and J. P. McGovern became members of the Union. The following officers were elected: Charles McGonigle, president; D. The Phoenix Gazette says General A. J. Sampson and wife have arrived at Quito, Ecuador. The general has many friends here who will be pleased to learn of his safe arrival in that foreign land.

One of the resources of the valley has received very little attention and that is tobacco raising. It is true it is but in the experimental stage, but it has been demonstrated that tobacco can grow here with proper attention.

**BUSTAQO PADILLA ACQUITTED.**

Such was the verdict of the Jury That Heard the Evidence in the Case. The trial of the Territory of New Mexico vs. Bustaquo Padilla, charged with being one of the murders of Faustina Ortiz, in March, 1890, was concluded in the territorial district court and conduced to the jury about 10:30 o'clock last night, says the New Mexican. At 12:25 a. m. the jury reached an agreement and returned a sealed verdict.

At ten o'clock this morning, in the presence of a large number of spectators, Chief Justice Smith, who has presided for Judge Langhain during the two weeks the trial has been in progress, opened and read the verdict which acquitted the defendant of the infamous crime with which he was charged.

Thereupon the chief justices called Bustaquo Padilla to the bar and commanded every one in the court room to arise. Addressing the defendant, he recited salient features of the confession of Jose Amado Martinez, wherein Martinez testified that, on the night of March 1, 1890, when Faustina Ortiz disappeared, the defendant confided to him the keys to the door of the saloon. Rodriguez and Juan Pablo Dominguez had killed Faustina Ortiz in the office of Rodriguez, and by means of force and intimidation induced him (Martinez) to assist the three murderers in carrying the body to the sandy arroyo northwest of the city where it was found, partly buried, twenty-eight days later.

The chief justice then held up Jose Amado Martinez to the scorn and contempt of all men for having held this knowledge of one of the most infamous crimes in the criminal annals of the territory in his secret bosom for several long years, until two of the men whom he accused were dead and the time for certainly convicting the culprit had passed, thus defeating the ends of justice and doing the public an irreparable wrong.

In discharging the defendant the judge recommended him to go back to his family and friends and usual occupation and avoid the danger of ever again being arraigned for an infamous crime by leading an upright life.
