**MAGDALENA AND KELLY.**

The Stone Legend of Magdalena—How the Aztecs Won Battles.

**TWO BUSINESS DIRECTORIES**  
Special Correspondence.

Magdalena, N. M., April 17.—On a branch of the Santa Fe railway, twenty miles west of Socorro, lies Magdalena, a pretty little town, prettily located. The railroad was built to this town in 1884. The town is about two thousand feet higher than Socorro, and probably few towns in New Mexico are more charmingly situated.

Magdalena is the shipping point for a large area of country. Until cattle were transferred to various points in the Union, Magdalena ranked as the greatest cattle shipping point in the territory. It now is considered to be known as the second largest in that regard.

While a number of rich old cattle owners have dropped out of the business in this section, their places have been assumed by considerably more numerous owners of small herds.

These herds are multiplying very rapidly, so the shipment of steers from Magdalena is about as large as it ever was.

As a wool shipping station, the town is also very favorably known, such as Solomon Luna, Juan Garcia, Montague Stevens, the Aragon and the Pinos, having their flocks grazing in the vicinity.

The lead mining industry at Kelly also contributes to the welfare of Magdalena.

There are six mines at Kelly, two of which are now working, the Graphic and Kelly mines. The former is the more important, employing about seventy-five men. A smelter, which closed down three months ago, "gives" employment to twenty-five more men. This smelter, which has been in operation for two years, will

again be blown in May. The little camp of Kelly lies at the mouth of the beautiful valley terminates in the Magdalena mountains.

When the picture of a mining camp is brought to the mind, usually rough looking canyons, towering cliffs and a chaos of upheaves are contemplated.

But from the rise on which Kelly is located, looking north to and beyond Magdalena, which is 1,000 feet lower, a charming valley is spread.

Green herbage is there to delight, and the whole presents an entrancing view. When the observer contemplates what a desirable transformation could be effected here by the aid of water, how prosperous ranches and gardens could superst a vast and contented community, the thoughts must revert to something else or be in danger of criticizing the works of a generously good Providence who seemingly has withheld the one thing needed.

An object that is pointed out to every visitor, and never fails to interest, is a curious formation in the side of the mountain half way up between Magdalena and Kelly.

A small avalanche of rock and sand from the top of the mountain has fallen and lodged in such a way as to form a most striking profile of a woman's face.

Katholistic and pious fathers of an early day discovered that the face was sculptured by nature to resemble that of Mary Magdalene, she who comforted Christ and was comforted by Him.

HENCE THE NAME, MAGDALENA MOUNTAINS, was given to the range and subsequently, when the little town was founded, it adopted the same cognomen.

The naming of the hills dates back far beyond the recollection of any one now living, and from this fact is evolved the following brief legend concerning it:

"The peaceable and industrious Aztecs who inhabited this region in a pre-historic age were constantly in dread of tribes of Indians who almost continually harassed them and interfered with their peaceful pursuits. On an occasion when their foes appeared in greater numbers than usual and the Aztecs seemed about to have all those in that section decimated they invoked

THE AID OF MARY MAGDALENE. She appeared among them creating courage and strength to the Aztecs so they were enabled to utterly rout their enemies, who never more molested them. From that day the features of the sainted woman were impressed upon the mountain side as now seen."

That's the tradition. Magdalena has a church of the Methodist denomination and a good school with forty pupils enrolled, that continues nine months in the year. When the county funds refuse to respond, the citizens support the school from their own purses. Mrs. W. A. Graham is the efficient teacher. The school at Kelly has about eighty pupils. Mrs. Cipriano Baca having charge of those little men and women.

The stock includes everything in dry goods, groceries, tinware, hardware, harness, implements and a line of farm wagons and other vehicles stretch for a block in length alongside the firm's building. They are general outfitters for ranchmen, stockmen, lumbermen and miners. J. S. Macfarland is the courteous young local manager, and no doubt much of the firm's success in these parts is due to his energetic efforts in its behalf. He is aided by a competent force of assistants.

Magdalena has two very good hotels—the Allen hotel and the Herbert house. The former is owned by J. M. Allen and the Herbert is operated by Mrs. J. D. Herbert. Guests are made to feel comfort-
