**THE DEADLY SMALLPOX.** The Las Vegas Optic, in an article on smallpox—a disease which is raging in some parts of the territory at present—has the following to say as an appeal for vaccination: "Every man, woman and child who has not been successfully vaccinated in the past few years, for self-protection and the protection of their neighbor and the community at large, should attend to this all-important matter at once. Smallpox has so far affected only the children. It has been fatal in a large percentage of the cases, but has so far mostly been confined to the small towns and country homes in nearly all sections of the territory. However, as winter is approaching, at which time of year smallpox thrives and is the most fatal, not confining itself alone to children but to persons of all ages, too much attention cannot be given nor the law too rigidly enforced by the county and city authorities in enforcing vaccination and quarantining, that thus this dreaded and contagious disease may be wiped out."

**"A LITTLE DAPPER MAN."** The New York Sun, in its description of the landing of the "Rough Riders" at Montank Point, contained this reference to Capt. Max Luna, of Troop F: "A little dapper man led troop F, which came out next. His rather worn-out clothes were carefully brushed and had much the appearance of the dandy. He carried a moustache at his side and saluted with infinite grace as he passed the line of officers at the head of the plier. He was Captain Maximilian Luna, who has the reputation of being one of the fiercest fighters in the regiment. His men tell stories of Capt. Luna that makes a man's eyes open wide, and the best part of it is that they are all true. As the troops marched by there was a chorus of 'Holla Senor Luna' from the Rough Riders in the crowd, and a little man turned around to wave his hand to those who greeted him. He was Private Senor who was left behind in Tampa when the Rough Riders sailed away. His one might be shipped out, smuggled himself on a transport, and showed up a few mornings later in the Rough Riders' camp at Santiago. Senor has earned his pardon for deserting many times over. There was great joy among his friends at his safe return, and there will be several bottles waiting for the man who had the nerve to desert in order to get a fight, when he gets out of quarantine."

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**NEW MEXICO NEWS!**  
CERRILLOS.  
From the Register.  
Andy Arizson and wife went to Santa Fe Thursday by the overland route.  
A barber is now one of the needs of Cerrillos. There is a good opportunity for the right man.  
Local politicians have figured out that Hon. J. T. Laughlin of San Pedro, will have a walk-over for a re-nomination for county commissioner.  
A crab apple tree in the Rogers garden one and a half miles from Cerrillos bore 640 pounds of fruit this season. A little labor and care produce good results in this valley.  
About two miles below Wadda Thursday, while a gang of workmen were repairing a bridge, the scaffolding gave away and precipitated the men to the ground. There were six or eight of them involved in the wreck and some of them fell a distance of eighteen feet. Dr. Palmer was called to look after the wounded. There was a few of the men severely injured, but no bones broken.  
The big 50-ton dredger recently imported by the Monto Cristo Mining company and unloaded at Thornton, is to be taken to pieces and transported by wagon to its destination near San Pedro. The plan of moving the huge machine entire was abandoned on account of some accident to the moving machinery. W. L. Trimble, of Albuquerque has the contract for moving the machinery by wagons.

**LABOR DAY PROCLAMATION.**

Now, therefore, I, George H. Wallace, acting governor of the territory of New Mexico, do hereby declare Monday, the 5th day of September, in the year One Thousand Eight Hundred and Nine (1908), a legal holiday, and earnestly recommend that all business of whatever nature, except such as the necessities of the community require to be carried on, be suspended on that day, and that all who may have an opportunity to observe the day in such a manner as may to them seem best and benefitting the occasion.
