OFFICERS RETURN EMPTY HANDED

Claude Doane, Alleged Murderer and Horse Thief Gives Posse Slip.

HIS BOLDNESS IS ASTONISHING

This afternoon Captain J. F. Fullerton and Sergeant R. W. Lewis, of the New Mexico mounted police; Fred Fournoff, of the United States secret service; Ben Williams, special agent of the Santa Fe railway, and five other officers, returned to the city from Los Padillas, where they went last night in hopes of capturing Claude Doane, the ex-convict, who is wanted for murder, and who made a daring raid on the outskirts of this city last Wednesday night and drove away a number of horses.

The party reached Los Padillas, where Doane has had his rendezvous for the past ten days, several hours before daylight, and took their places in the brush. After each man had been placed by Captain Fullerton, they waited for daylight to come, when it was their plan to surprise Doane and his gang.

At the first peep of dawn each officer was on the alert, his eyes searching the horizon for a glimpse of the desperado and his confederates. However, they were disappointed, as the crafty Doane had taken advantage of the light to escape further south. The posse rode up to the house where he had been staying, and written on the water tank of the corral was the inscription: "Claude Doane, June 30, 1905."

Captain Fullerton is of the opinion that Doane is still in hiding near Albuquerque and that it is only a question of a few days when he will be caught napping. He said it was probably true that Doane and a member of his gang was at the stock yards, south of this city, yesterday afternoon.

The officers have by no means given up the search and the man is not believed to have the slightest chance to escape.


