### FRANK W. PARKER

PRESIDENT AND EDITOR OF SOCORRO SPANISH PAPER UNDER ARREST.

Just before the Chieftain goes to press warrants have been issued for the arrest of Messrs. Melton and Anastacio Torres on the charge of libel against Hon. Frank W. Parker, associate justice for this judicial district. The action is brought by District Attorney Efigio Baca and is based on a clause of an article in yesterday's issue of El Defensor del Pueblo, which clause says in effect that if the Chieftain is scandalized by the sentences of the court, it ought to seek information from the lawyers, the judge, etc., and it will be convinced of bribery and political intrigues to condemn to save criminals, not by the verdicts of juries but by other means with which the partisan Chieftain is well acquainted. The words of the Defensor are as follows: "Si se escandaliza (El Chieftain) por las sentencias, debe informarse con los abogados, juez, etc., y se convencerá del cohecho e intrigas políticas para condenar o salvar a los reos, no por la decisión de los jurados, sino por otras causas que el parcial 'Chieftain' bien conoce."

The article referred to did not meet the editor's attention until just before the Chieftain goes to press. It will be commented upon next week—Socorro Chieftain.

## LOSE FIRST TAKE SECOND

Las Vegas and Albuquerque Break Even in Two Games.

## BROWNS PLAYED FINE YESTERDAY

The Browns broke even in the two games with the Las Vegas Blues at Gallinas Park Saturday and Sunday. Las Vegas took the first game by a score of 10 to 4, while the Blues dropped Sunday's game to Albuquerque by the close score of 6 to 5.

The game Saturday was quite interesting, despite the one-sided score. Pettus made a home run, and the Browns besides, had two two-baggers and one three bagger to their credit. Gallagos struck out eight Las Vegas batters and allowed fourteen hits. On the other hand, Matney only succeeded in getting two strike-outs and allowed sixteen hits.

The Blues, however, bunched their hits and did some spectacular base stealing, while the Albuquerqueans' hits were scattered, and almost invariably came when the bases were vacant. Gallagos also was somewhat wild, and presented four men with a free pass to first base.

## Sunday's Game.

The game yesterday was a pitcher's battle from start to finish. "Rip" Starr allowed but four hits and struck out fourteen batters, while Fanning, the star of the Blues' pitching staff, struck out six men and allowed the visitors but three hits.

Both teams fielded very fast ball, and the game was made up of sensational plays. Neher, who played third base for Albuquerque, easily being the most conspicuous player during the game. He made many difficult catches without an error. The Browns played together, and were always sure to find the ball, pulling out of tight places and playing the game like veterans.

The final score was 6 to 5, Albuquerque being on the long end of the score, and making the series stand one to one.

The Browns are arranging to play the newly organized El Paso Colts at El Paso next Saturday and Sunday.
