BAILES REQUIRED TO PAY LICENSE

County Clerk Will See That Statute Governing Same is Enforced.

WILL INCREASE COUNTY REVENUE

Probate Clerk James A. Summers, of Bernalillo county, acting upon instructions from the board of county commissioners, is preparing a circular letter instructing all justices of the peace outside the city of Albuquerque, to see that the law providing for the collecting of licenses from any person or persons, conducting a baile, fandango, etc., for profit, and where liquors are sold, is rigidly enforced.

A glance over the criminal records of Bernalillo county shows that a large percentage of the crimes of violence committed, have originated at dances where liquors are sold. The enforcement of this law, which also provides that a proper person shall be deputized as a peace officer, to see that perfect order prevails, will result in much benefit and the payment of the proper license will also increase the revenues in the county treasury.

The circular letter is as follows: Sir—I am directed by the board of county commissioners to call your attention to the fact that licenses are required for baile, as you will see by the statutes hereinafter quoted:

Section 6 of Chapter 12, of the Compiled Laws of 1865 is as follows:

Section 6. It shall be the duty of every person who shall give a baile or fandango to apply to some justice of the peace or judge of probate for a license, who are hereby required to grant the same; but if, in the judgment of the justice of the peace or judge of probate, the person soliciting such license is not a competent person, it shall be his duty to so state to the applicant in order that he may present some person able to act as an officer of police during said baile or fandango, to whom he will administer an oath that he will faithfully proceed as a police officer, with the power of a sheriff, in keeping good order and the peace at said baile or fandango.

Of the foregoing section, the first clause down to the words "grant the same," is still in force, the remainder of the section being substituted by section 1903 of the Compiled Laws of 1897.

The seventh paragraph of section 2901 of the Compiled Laws of 1884, fixes the amount of the license, and is as follows:

Seventh—All persons who allow in their houses or upon premises under their control, any dance or fandango, or baile or night, or where, or in connection with which, liquors of any kind are sold, shall pay \$10 for each day or night on which such dance or fandango is kept or held.

The above paragraph has never been repealed, and it is your duty to see that the law is enforced in your precinct, and that the license money reaches the county treasury. Respectfully,

Today Secretary Sellers was around distributing some very handsome posters advertising the fair. The posters represent a cowgirl riding a broncho at full speed and throwing dust in the faces of several cowboys who are left some distance in the rear. The posters will be sent broadcast over the territory and will undoubtedly result in attracting many outsiders to the fair.

SCHOOLS WILL OPEN SEPTEMBER FIFTH

Repairs to Buildings Completed and Everything is Ready.

IMPORTANT MEETINGS AT PORTLAND

ALBUQUERQUE SHOULD BE REPRESENTED AT TRANSMISSISSIPPI AND IRRIGATION CONGRESSES.

Hon. L. Bradford Prince is in the city today and is anxious to arouse additional interest in Albuquerque in the Trans-Mississippi congress and the national irrigation congress, as he is the New Mexico member of the executive committee in each of these organizations.

This year, for the convenience of delegates, it has been arranged that both congresses shall meet at the exposition grounds at Portland, Ore., and that one shall immediately succeed the other. The Trans-Mississippi congress will hold its sessions from August 16 to 19, and the irrigation congress begins on the succeeding Monday, August 21.

New Mexico has large interest in the proceedings of each of these bodies. At the former, the subject of statehood for the territories will be a prominent topic, and in the latter, the whole question of irrigation will be considered in all its details.

WILLIAM MCINTOSH AGAIN SHOWS HIS LIBERALITY

William McIntosh, the wealthy sheep grower of the Chulita country, whose many generous donations to worthy enterprises is well known, has again come to the front.

Mr. McIntosh, while on a visit to South Africa some years ago, became acquainted with Cecil Rhodes, the multi-millionaire diamond mine owner. Consequently, he has taken a deep interest in the working out of one of the great man's bequests, the Rhodes scholarship at Oxford.

The scholarship awarded to New Mexico was won by James Bell, of the university, and that young man will leave this fall for England to enter upon his studies. The scholarship fund makes no provision for transportation, which is quite an expense.

Mr. McIntosh, who has taken a lively interest in the career of Mr. Bell, has signified his intention of furnishing the young man with transportation to the English college, which is a very generous and commendable act on the part of the sheep owner.
