The entire party paid a visit to the Pall, Hawaii's famous battleground.

LAKWOOD NOT INJURED, BUT COUNTRY SUFFERED.

John Fuller and J. H. Stewart, of Lakewood, drove down from that place to Carlsbad last Wednesday afternoon, says the Argus. They report the roads badly washed in some places. They had a narrow escape from having their buggy overturned when they crossed Rocky arroyo. Had it not been for two heavy top chests which they were bringing with them, they doubtless would have been upset by the swift current of the stream. They brought definite information regarding the true conditions at Lakewood. The town is high and dry, and has suffered none from the water. Although the amount of water in the lake is considerable less than last fall, it was on account of the bed of the lake being filled with silt from last year, backed up at least three feet higher than it was at any time last fall.

The homestead of Charles Colyer, which adjoins the lake front, was practically inundated, the water rising several inches over the floor of his house.

The high water also carried out a portion of the Fox Mile dam, rendering it absolutely useless.

The flood waters, which carried out the Pomasco bridge, also took about one mile of track on either side of the bridge. The homes of both Messrs. Marable and Dougherty are reported to have been swept away by the same waters which carried out the above named bridge. The houses were of adobe construction, and it is presumed the water caused them to crumble and fall. The report stated that Mr. Marable lost all of his household goods, but that Mr. Dougherty managed to remove and save a portion of his belongings.

CITY LIBRARIAN HAD BUSY MONTHS DURING JUNE AND JULY REPORT FOR PAST TWO MONTHS SHOWS THAT INSTITUTION IS PROVING VERY POPULAR.

Miss Nell Weller, librarian of the Albuquerque public library, has submitted her report for the months of June and July. The report shows that the library is in a flourishing condition and is proving a very popular institution among the book lovers.

The report is as follows: To the Members of the Library Board: No meeting has been held the past two months, so the reports for June and July will be given together.

The number of books circulated for home use was 2,990. Of these, 544 were juvenile fiction, 705 juvenile non-fiction, 1,885 adult fiction and 456 non-fiction.

June 22 twenty-three books were received from the Philadelphia Book Store company, costing \$13.65, plus \$3 freight, making a total of \$16.65. These books were greatly reduced in price, but are almost as good as new, very few showing any wear at all.

July 12, eleven books, all new fiction, were received. These cost \$19.85, express charges, \$1.50; total, \$21.35. During the two months eight books have been given to the library, viz.:

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GOVERNOR KIBBEY OFFERS REWARD FOR MURDERERS. LADIES INJURED IN A BAD RUNAWAY.

Governor Kibbey, of Arizona, yesterday issued a proclamation of reward of \$500 for the arrest and conviction of the murderers of Sam Plunkett and E. E. Kennedy, at Livingston on July 12. There is now \$1,050 on the heads of the murderers. Immediately after the discovery of the murder Gila county offered a reward of \$300. A week later the reward was increased to \$500, the rest having probably been offered by the relatives of Plunkett.
