### SANTA FE GETS WATER AT WILLARD

A Strong Flow Is Struck At The Depth of Only 152 Feet

PUMPING 106 GALLONS A MINUTE

Drilling on the artesian well by the Eastern railway of New Mexico at Willard which has been going on for some time, has been stopped. It is presumed on account of the fact that the well is now 152 feet deep with 112 feet of water in the drill hole. For several days a pump had been at work with the result of pumping 106 gallons per minute, but the water in the well could not be lowered by this pump. This indicated that the flow of water was so great and so strong that further drilling would be useless, and that it would be cheaper to pump the available supply of water, which is very great to a height of 30 to 40 feet, than to proceed with the drilling. In addition to this well, the Santa Fe railway at Willard has two other supply wells, one of them being 20 feet in diameter and 45 feet deep, with an ample supply of water. The second well is 35 feet deep and 10 feet in diameter, also with a good supply of water, which, of late, is being pumped out constantly to supply stock in the vicinity. The water is of the best, both for domestic and engine use. From the well described as being 25 feet deep and about 10 feet in diameter, the entire water supply for the growing camp at Willard has been pumped, and the water has not been lowered an inch. This well supplies about one hundred men and eighty-five two-horse teams.

The Santa Fe has already erected an up to date, strong and fine water tank, which has been pumped full and low contains between forty-five and fifty thousands gallons. Rail laying for the switches at Willard commenced Monday. A switch engine has arrived, via the Santa Fe Central, and is now being used for the unloading of rails and material in the yards of the Eastern railway.

### COURT RULES THERE IS NEVER "PEACEFUL PICKETING"

Judge Smith McPherson of the circuit court of the United States of the southern district of Iowa handed down an opinion recently in which he deals vigorously with the right of strikers to "picket" an establishment where there is a strike in progress. The opinion is attracting the attention not only of attorneys, but of business men and others who have seen it. In the opinion, Judge McPherson says in one place: "There is and can be no such thing as peaceful picketing, any more than there can be chaste vulgarity, or peaceful mobbing or lawful lynching." The ease which brought forth Judge McPherson's words arose over the differences that the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe railroad had with striking employees in 1904. A strike was threatened and the company discharged the instigators and from that time on there has been a "lock out." Pickets were put out by the men when the company brought an injunction, Judge McPherson says that the right of the company to discharge employees with or without cause cannot be questioned and the right of the men to quit their employment either individually or as a union is equally beyond dispute. Judge McPherson says further, in part: "There would not have been the slightest occasion for bringing this case, had there been any sincerity and honesty of purpose by the local authorities to maintain peace and order. Intimidation, force, violence and brutality were all winked at, because

of the belief on the part of certain peace officers that they would be kindly remembered on future election days, instead of remembering that the great majority of the people of the city are law abiding, and would reward those who would maintain peace and preserve order to say nothing of the peace of mind arising from duty performed. The evidence shows that parties in the employ of the company, have been assaulted by the strikers for no offense, for no wrong, for no crime, but solely because they elected to work under terms mutually satisfactory. The accused stoutly deny any complicity. Employees have been denounced and called scabs and the most vulgar and profane names applied to them for the sole reason that they elected to work, when work was offered to them of a satisfactory character, and at prices agreeable. But the proofs tend to show some of them guilty. "The test of manhood and the rights of man or property is not to be measured by braggarts or bullies, or vulgarity or profanity, and the saloons must not be the place where supposed rights are to be decreed, as the evidence in this case shows has been attempted many times by some of those on the strike. This court has a concern that peace and quiet prevail and that a state of serfdom of picketing of one crowd of men over another. No self-respecting man will submit to it. Nor does he have to resort to force to get rid of it. He need only apply to the courts, state or federal, and he will be given an order to end it."

### TWO ROADS BALK ON ANTI-PASS AGREEMENT.

All but two of the western railroads have joined in the latest reform proposition, to stop giving passes and reduced passenger rates in order to secure passenger and freight traffic. The order for this reform came from Wall Street about a week ago, and the railway officials in the west are making a great bustle over carrying out the order. Speaking officially, all of them declare that this reform will be permanent, regardless of the history of all former agreements to maintain rates. Confidentially speaking, many of the railway officials predict that "history will repeat itself," and that the "present spasm of virtue" will not last long. Unless the two roads which have refused to become parties to the anti-pass agreement can be induced to join without delay, the agreement will soon be worthless.

### RAILROADS MAY ADOPT PATENT SMOKE CONSUMERS.

Robert Quayle, superintendent of motive power, and other officials of the Chicago & Northwestern, after experimenting eight months with a hollow arch in the fire box of a locomotive stumbled upon a solution of the problem of smoke consumption. They found that while the engine was working smoke was eliminated without regard to the quality of the fuel. The company's switch engines are now to be equipped with the device. This is an important discovery, and if it becomes available for railroads generally, will forever end a cause for bitter complaint in many localities. There will be no excuse for railroads not adopting the device, assuming that they will have the right to do so and that it will do all that is claimed. It will be a great boon to travelers, who on hot days open car windows in the hope of getting relief from the in-

tolerable heat of the car, only to get their eyes and noses filled with cinders and smoke. Railroad officials declare that the thing that appeals to them about this hollow arch is the economy of fuel. Several of the Northwestern's locomotives have been equipped for experimental purposes and they have been tried on all sections of the road, with a saving of nearly one third in the amount of the fuel used. Some other roads have experimented with this arch, among them the Lake Shore and the Santa Fe, but they have not put them on the switching engines. The method by which the smoke is eliminated by this device is simply, being a thorough mixing of air with the carbons, thereby assuring perfect combustion.

Dan E. Cain, general manager of the Rock Island, and Frank Dolan, general superintendent of the southwest district of the same road, have returned to Topeka from an inspection trip over the El Paso division.

Trustee of Institute for the Blind. R. A. Pierce of Alamogordo has been re-appointed by Governor Otero as a member of the board of trustees of the New Mexico Institute for the Blind.

Member of Board of Trustees of Deaf and Dumb Asylum. Governor Otero has appointed Marcelino Garcia of Santa Fe a member of the board of trustees of the New Mexico Asylum for the Deaf and Dumb, vice Francisco Delgado, resigned.
