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ALLEGED BURGLARS ARE IDENTIFIED AS MURDERERS.

Manuel and Domingo Chavez, two Mexicans in jail at Alamogordo on a charge of robbing M. V. Mitchell's store at that place on July 15, have been identified as the murderers of Sam Plunkett and Ed Kennedy, at Livingston, Ariz., on July 12. The murder of Plunkett and Kennedy was one of the bloodiest crimes ever committed in Arizona, and ever since its commission officers throughout the southwest have been diligently at work in the hunt for the murderers. The Americans were set upon by Mexicans while they were at home, and both of them butchered in a horrible manner. Nearly a dozen stab wounds were made on each body and the head of one of the victims was crushed from a blow by some blunt instrument. The motive for the murder was robbery.
