

# SANTA FE EXCURSION TOOK 388 PEOPLE

## Browns Thoroughly Trowned by Santa Fe Centrals—Score Was Eleven to Four.

The excursion to Santa Fe yesterday carried 388 people, including the Italian band and the ball team. The train left the local station shortly after 7 o'clock and arrived at the Capital City at 10:45, and the excursionists were met by the Santa Fe artillery band and a crowd of Santa Fe people. A procession was formed, with the Santa Fe band in the lead, the Italian band and ball team, with a long string of posters. The reception was most cordial.

Upon reaching Santa Fe the visitors swarmed the plaza and crowded the hotels. A band played inspiring music in Santa Fe's one green spot, and the ancient city experienced an awakening that occurs about once a year, and that is when Albuquerqueans turn out en masse and makes a pilgrimage there.

## CUBA HAS MONEY TO BURN

**SURPLUS OF \$22,000,000, WHILE FUTURE LOOKS MIGHTY GOOD.**

By Gonzales de Quesada, Cuban Minister at Washington. Washington, D. C., Aug. 28.—The prosperity of Cuba is such that even the most optimistic are surprised at the results which are shown by the latest statistics. There is no section of the country that has not received a great impetus, commercially or industrially, and the influx of tourists and investors during the past year has been such that there were not sufficient hotel accommodations for them, and new and modern hotels will be built for the coming winter.

The greatest proof of the development of Cuba during the administration of President Palma can be found in the study of the last figures of the official report of the Cuban treasury, showing the results of the conservative, wise and progressive government which has ruled the island during the last three years.

The total receipts for the year were \$61,751,095.72 plus \$7,995,584.86 balance of the previous year, giving a grand total of \$69,746,680.58, and if \$44,564,467.43, the year's payments, be deducted, a balance remains of \$24,249,207.20, the amount in the Cuban treasury on July last, which, after suffering some deductions for outstanding credits, left about \$22,000,000 surplus.

Part of this will be devoted to public works and part to serve as basis for the money to be applied to settle the balance due to the army.

The government of Cuba, which has so far been very careful of contracting financial obligations, will deal with this matter in the same conservative and commendable manner in which it has heretofore handled the questions which have arisen, and always inspired in the best interests of the country and mindful of her laws and international obligations.
