

BIG BOOM IN PEACE FOR U. S. IN THE FAR EAST

Tremendous Increase in Commerce Foreshadowed With Japan, China and Other Parts of the Far East Now That the War Is Over

Our Great Pacific Coast Will Benefit Immensely from the Trade That Is Sure to Flow from That Region as the New and Big Business in Rice With Japan.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 9.—With the restoration of peace between Russia and Japan the eyes of the commercial world are turned in the direction of the orient, in expectation of a great commercial boom.

No country is in so favorable a position to grasp the new business opportunity as the United States, and no part of the United States is so favorably located to participate in the new activity as the cities of the Pacific coast.

An announcement which is almost startling in its possible significance is that from the Bureau of Manufactures which observes that in the brief period of the war the value of the goods which the United States has sent that country jumped from \$90,952,000 for a similar period a year ago to \$142,559,000.

It might be supposed that this great increase was due to the increased purchases by Japan or articles made necessary by the war. But such is not the case. The largest item in the sudden expansion is cotton, which jumped from \$17,810,000 for the six months of 1904 to \$22,221,000 for the six months just ended.

China, too—despite the boycott—is doing more business today with the United States than ever in its history. The report of the Bureau of Statistics for the commerce of the twelve months just ended shows that exports to the Chinese empire were \$52,516,361, as compared with \$12,862,432 for the corresponding period in 1904.

But the present increase in business, in the opinion of Major John M. Carson, chief of the Bureau of Manufactures, is merely an opening wedge, and the future of the United States in its trade relations with the orient depends on what is done at this, the psychological moment.

Major Carson referred to the establishment of a permanent exhibition in Shanghai, where goods may be displayed, and information given out for the benefit of American commerce. An extensive report on the matter has been received from Mr. Baruch Sert of San Francisco, whose practical experience in oriental trade and familiarity with Chinese language and customs makes his advice of great value.

It is anticipated that there will be a cessation of orders for articles which were needed for the immediate prosecution of the war, such as explosives, arms, beans and flour. But any momentary diminution of purchases of this character will, it is predicted, be more than offset by the demand for works of peace.

Of railway supplies an enormous amount will be needed at once. The Siberian railroad will have to be almost entirely reconstructed, and already hundreds of thousands of tons of American rails are under contract for laying down in Manchuria.

As to Russia, the rebuilding of her navy will keep every American shipyard busy for a long time.

Then will follow the exploitation and commercial development of the new Manchurian territory and of the island of Saghalien. In China, also, commercial ventures, which have hitherto been in the face of doubt as to whether Russia or Japan would be the dominating power of the future in that field will be taken up.

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS CANNOT QUESTION SUFFICIENCY OF BOND WITHOUT SUBJECTING THEMSELVES TO REMOVAL.

To the Evening Citizen: In the article in the contribution to your paper yesterday by "A Citizen" it is suggested that it is the duty of the county commissioners to see that the treasurer and collector give bond with sufficient security, and calls attention of Chairman Grunstead to the tax returns of the sureties upon the bonds of the governor's appointee as treasurer and collector. It is true that Section 687 of the Compiled Laws provides that it shall be the duty of the county commissioners to examine and inquire into the sufficiency of the security of the bonds of the treasurer and all other county officers, and if insufficient, to secure the giving of new bonds or the office becomes vacant. This proposition as submitted by "A Citizen" is quite correct, and the contention against the power asserted by the governor that it should not be passed by. The governor has been giving orders to the county commissioners and other county officers as to what they should do. He assumes that the county commissioners and county officers are his subordinates and that he is absolutely right in his orders, and that he is not subject to his orders, therefore, that if the county commissioners should attempt to inquire into the sufficiency of the sureties of the bonds of the governor, it would be an insubordination in office and that would certainly be a good ground for removal under the powers conferred for and in behalf of the governor.
