Railroad Topics

LIVERY MEN BEAT NEW RAILROAD'S PRICES.

The broad gauge train, running on wild schedule, any time it gets ready, departed for Aztec at 10 o'clock this morning, carrying twenty or thirty people. The Eagles having arranged to go down in rigs will start early tomorrow morning with a big crowd, having made arrangements with the liveries so a person can make the round trip for \$1.50--Durango Herald.

RAILROAD COMMISSION ENJOINED BY COURT.

The general attorneys of the Texas railroads have secured an injunction against the railroad commission of Texas forbidding the putting into effect of an emergency rate on dry goods. The rate was much lower than the usual tariff, and put several Texas jobbing points at an advantage over the big jobbing plants of the country. A big legal fight is expected to follow as the result of the temporary order.

STRONG ON GETTING RAILWAY PASSES.

Railroads in Colorado have instructed their political agents to lobby a bill through the next republican legislature to adopt the Roosevelt-Nebraska railroad policy. "Big passes" for state officials is the meaning of this policy. The railroads say that the greatest raid in history was made upon them at the last session of the legislature, they being compelled to carry thousands of free. At the present time every office holder in Colorado has a pass--Trinidad Advertiser.

PRIVATE CAR OF ILL. FATED MAXIMILIAN.

Emperor Maximilian's private car is again in service on the Mexican. For several months this historic old coach has been in the shops undergoing repairs. It has received a new coat of paint and various minor repairs have been made, which places the side door car in condition not much worse than when it was first placed in service half a century ago. The car is the easiest riding car among the rolling stock of the Mexican railway, but it is something to be the host of a private car in which one's guests make the trip in the only car that was ever destined for an emperor of Mexico, and this may account for the demand for the car. It is kept and operated as a special car--El Paso Herald.

NEW YORK CENTRAL HAS NEW KIND OF THIRD RAIL.

An entirely new kind of third rail has been adopted by the New York Central road for use on its electric service between the Grand Central and Croton and White Plains. The third rail is suspended in wooden sheathings, held up every eleven feet by iron brackets. The shoe of the train will make its contact with the under surface of the third rail. Officials say there will be practically no danger in this kind of third rail. There will be no projecting live edges or bolts, and no slot. The only possibility of reaching the third rail will be from below and by an upward movement, and this will decrease the chance of injury from a shock. The third rail, thus suspended and sheathed, will also be protected from the weather.

WILL BUILD FREIGHT CARS IN OWN SHOPS.

The Northern Pacific has plans prepared for enlargement of its South Tacoma car shops to permit the building there of 150 freight cars per

month. Cheapness of lumber here more than offsets the fact that the wheels, iron and steel needed in car construction cost more here than in the east.

For ten or more years, South Tacoma shops have each year built several hundred cars. It is believed the starting of car construction here on such a scale will result in the transferring to Puget sound of part of the car building industry now centered in the east. Fir lumber is being used increasingly in car construction, and two large eastern car building companies have sent men here to investigate the desirability of establishing western branch works. It is believed cars can be built here cheaper than in the east. The South Tacoma plant now employs 700 men.

FIRST ENGINE RUN OVER S. F. R. & E. R. R. TUESDAY

The Raton & Eastern railway assumed a practical form Tuesday afternoon when the first engine was run out from the Santa Fe round house, says the Raton Range. The work of grading is being pushed at the outer extremity and the laying of rails has begun at the Raton end of the line. The first steel was laid last week with material unloaded at the shops, but by the first of this week it was deemed practical to run out an engine to convey the material. The track up to date, has been laid about a mile and a half out of Raton. The line when completed will connect the city with the new coal mines now being opened in the Sugarite canon. In order to do this it will require about twelve miles of track. The company is employing a large force of men and pushing the work with all possible speed. At the present rate it will require about three weeks to connect the city with the Sugarite pit.
