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NEW ANAESTHETIC

Word comes from Philadelphia that Dr. Orville Horwitz, the leading surgeon connected with St. Agnes hospital, is making a series of tests and experiments with Scopolamine, a new anaesthetic, which promises to displace ether, chloroform and all other anaesthetics in general use by surgeons all over the world.

At first it was feared that the drug would not be effective enough to stand the test of exceedingly painful operations, but at a recent tumor operation, in which Dr. Horwitz used Scopolamine as an anaesthetic, because the patient would not have survived the application of ether or chloroform, the drug stood the severe test of an operation with the electric knife, one of the most painful operations known to surgery.

One hour after the operation he awoke perfectly fresh and without the least indication of nausea or any of the unpleasant after effects which make ether and chloroform so objectionable in many cases.

They claim that Russian civil and military officers are responsible for the massacres because, they allege, the Russians disarmed the Armenians and abetted the assassins.

The Citizen has received a letter from Washington, D. C., which says "Roswell, Carlisle, Santa Fe and several other towns are getting ahead of your town in rural free delivery. EDGAR ALLEN POE AND THE SHORT STORY

Although it is perhaps a bit of over-exuberant patriotism to call Poe the inventor of the short story, writes Robert Mors Lovett in The Reader Magazine for August, "yet surely he first recognized the form as having an independent existence, and as possessing certain advantages which the novel has not, notably that of 'totality.'"

The vital difference between the true short story and the tale, says Mr. Lovett, appears in any study of American literature in the early years of the nineteenth century. "In America, as in England and in Europe generally, the cardinal fact to be reckoned with is the so-called romantic movement."

"Poe had undoubtedly a large influence on succeeding story writers, American, English and French. His influence has been the wider because his tales of cleverness really belong to no country or race. As in the case of Scille, the international French dramatist, what was significant in his work, his technique, could be transported anywhere, would pass current among all nations, and could be counterfeited by any man or industry."
