Alejandro Sandoval, of Corrales, has let a contract to Wallace Hessel for the erection of four modern cottages at the corner of First street and Fruit avenue. The total cost of the houses will be in the neighborhood of \$10,000.

The Holbrook Argus says: W. H. Clark returned home from Albuquerque Tuesday morning, whither he had been at the bedside of Mrs. Clark, who was operated on for tumor. Mrs. Clark stood the operation nicely and is fast recovering.

Mrs. M. J. Borden, president of the New Mexico Woman's Christian Temperance Union, was a passenger for Las Vegas last night where she goes to complete arrangements for the annual meeting of the association, to be held there the 13th of this month.

Assistant United States District Attorney E. L. Medler, who has been confined to his home by an attack of typhoid fever, was able to be about today for the first time. Mrs. Medler had him in charge and took him for a drive over the city.

F. G. Plummer of the United States forest reserve service, arrived in Albuquerque last night from Santa Fe and will spend a few days here on official business. Mr. Plummer is engaged in going over the records with a view to correcting boundary lines of forest reserves in New Mexico.

Yesterday Willis McQuade, the 13-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. McQuade, celebrated his birthday anniversary, and it proved one of the nicest events in the life of the young man, for his papa and mamma prepared for the occasion, and every little boy and girl in his neighborhood, and all were invited and attended, had the best time imaginable. It was the finest little folks' party yet held in

the city, and Willis saw to it that his guests were well entertained. Lunch was served and the little people did ample justice thereto. The premises were decorated with Mexican daisies.

As a result of the wreck which occurred at Williams yesterday, the local Santa Fe hospital has received five injured Japanese laborers, and more are expected tonight and tomorrow. One of the patients received has quite extensive burns on both limbs. The remainder of the patients have numerous bruises, scratches and cuts on different parts of their bodies.

R. K. Farsworth, an old soldier of Williams, Ariz., writes to the Citizen from the Soldiers' Home, Los Angeles county, California, that he is an inmate of the hospital at the home, having gone there from Williams. He says he is suffering from cancer, and went to the home to have an operation performed, which was successful. He hopes to be well enough to return to Williams inside of a couple of months.

H. C. Dollison, who had a narrow escape from death a few days ago in the local shops, is reported to be much improved. His accident was a very singular one, being caused by having his head crushed with an air brake lever under an engine where he was working. A fellow workman, it is claimed, applied the air from the cab, causing the remarkable accident, which miraculously did not result in instant death. While there were no bones fractured, Mr. Dollison suffered from numerous bruises, lacerations, etc.

OPERATING IN THE GOLDEN MINING DISTRICT

State Senator Kirk, of New York city, is in the Golden mining district north of this city, in connection with the development work of the extensive placers owned by the industrial Gold Mining company in that section. The company owns 1,200 acres of placer ground. He is accompanied by Messrs. Wiswell and Watson, mining engineers and experts, with headquarters in Boston. The dirt on the placers of the company is to be worked under plans and by machinery invented by Mr. Wiswell. Great and beneficial results are expected from the machinery. This is not yet on the ground but it is believed that it will be there and in working order within six weeks. The capitalists, who hold the stock of the industrial Gold Mining company, live in New York and Boston, and through the recent explorations and investigations, have come to the conclusion that their property is rich and should be worked. There is a very good supply of water at the placers, as the company has two wells, each 600 feet deep, from which water will be pumped for the necessary machinery. Col. Farley is the superintendent of the company, with headquarters at Golden.

INVESTIGATING AND AUDITING COMMITTEE AT WORK

The investigating and auditing committee of the late territorial fair, held its first meeting last night at the office of P. F. McCannan, and at once proceeded to business. The committee was in session until 11 o'clock, and the investigations so far, on the face of checks drawn, bills paid and those not paid, reveals the fact that the deficit of the last fair will probably considerably exceed the startling figures of \$1,800, which were reported at the executive committee meeting Monday night. The committee will meet again tonight and continue in session until a final report is prepared, which will show the list of subscribers, the prizes and purses paid, the bills paid, and those of which checks have been drawn and not paid, the amounts received from concessions, and many other interesting details, which may prove to be instructive reading to the subscribers and financiers of the city and territory.

Arkansas W. C. T. U. Convention.


