GOLD AND COPPER IN JARILLA MINES

FAIR PERCENTAGE OF COPPER MIXED WITH GOLD IN THE VEINS.

A correspondent of the Denver News, writing from Jarilla, N. M. says:

The Ferro Ore and the Iron Hand, owned by Mr. Paul Ream of this place, is an iron-gold proposition, and to reach the junction of the two veins it is the intention of the owner to sink a working shaft on the Ferro and follow the vein to the crossing of the Iron Hand, where the best values are expected to lie.

Within the past few days the Nashville shaft of the Excelsior company has opened ore. Four feet of sulphide, which will run 4 to 5 per cent in copper has been opened and is being

The Lincoln property has opened ore at another point, small specks of native copper being visible to the naked eye in the spar. The Lincoln has proved up a continuous body of ore for over 400 feet on one vein. Ore has been piled up on all the workings, and at the present time the property could commence shipments of rock that would run \$40 per ton in copper and gold.

The Farm property, north of Brice, owned by Culver and Downs, is sinking on a shaft that follows a vein nearly thirty feet in width. This vein occurs in brown spar, is stained heavily with copper, and carries some gold.

The west drift of the Nannie Baird on the 500-foot level is driving in a constantly increasing body of ore as it progresses toward the Maggie shaft, located on the same vein, and which it is to follow.

Announcement from the main office of the Southwest Smelting and Refining company is to the effect that the furnaces of the smelter will be blown in within ninety days.

The north drift on the tunnel level of the Lucky is driving steadily in ore. The drift is following the porphyry for the hanging wall—the footwall is not in sight. At the point where the drift was started north, the vein widened rapidly, its width being such that it will be mined pillar and stall system.

PECULIAR PLACE WITHOUT ANY J. P.

Should a murder or any other kind of a crime be committed today in Lehi precinct there would be no justice of the peace there to try the case. It is not an uncommon thing for a justice of the peace to resign his office, but this case is rather unusual.

MORE CANDIDATES LANDED AT PENITENTIARY

In the sixth judicial district court for Guadalupe county at Santa Rosa last week, Judge Edward A. Mann presiding, Carlos Garcia was found guilty of larceny of a horse and was sentenced to two and a half years in the penitentiary and to pay a fine of \$300 and costs. Gregorio Apodaca was found guilty of larceny of a horse and sentenced to one year's imprisonment in the penitentiary and to pay a fine of \$500 and costs. Victoriano Paladino and Candelario Candelario, indicted jointly for robbery, were found not guilty.

COCHISE STATESMAN CAPTURING SHARKS

The Los Angeles Examiner, which arrived here yesterday, contains a large picture of the Hon. Charles Strong and Theo. Metz, of Biebee, together with that of a monster shark, weighing 386 pounds. Strong and Metz have been putting in considerable time at Catalina, and are reported to be slaughtering sharks. Strong some time since captured the largest one that has ever been caught at Catalina, which weighed 524 pounds, and is said by some to be the largest ever captured, so that Charles has quite a record.

WATER NEAR DEMING IN GREAT ABUNDANCE.

M. T. Brown of the Brown Realty Co., is elated over the large body of water he struck recently in his well near Deming, says the Las Cruces Citizen. The water is now within four feet of the surface. A test was made with the pump and the result was 8,000 gallons per minute, sufficient water to irrigate forty thousand acres of land. He spent last week in Deming, returning last Saturday, and left for Deming, Monday, and will remain there several days before returning to Las Cruces. Mr. Brown has already refused \$30,000 for his interest.

The Roswell fair opened Tuesday, with a good attendance from Texas and New Mexico. The weather was cold and cloudy in the morning and the attendance was much larger in the afternoon. The trains are bringing in hundreds of people from the north and south.

ARIZONA HORSES FIND GOOD MARKET IN THE GULF STATES.

There has been a large movement of range horses for several weeks past, from Arizona and New Mexico, to eastern points. Most of the shipments have been to east Texas, Mississippi and Louisiana. The demand for these animals has been active. The demand has perhaps been no greater than during many years, but the supply has been rather short, which has made buying more spirited. The shipments of range horses through El Paso and Deming have been maintained regularly, in small quantities, for several weeks.

PURCHASERS SLOW IN APPEARING THE PRESENT SEASON.

Stock buyers are less in evidence on the range than they have been at this season in past years. Cattlemen from the southern ranges say that little interest has been manifested as yet among the purchasers. Cattlemen are not in the least disturbed over this condition. Their stock is in the best of condition, and they declare that they are perfectly content to wait.

HUNTING IS GOOD NEAR LAS VEGAS.

S. L. Barker of Beulah, today exhibited a set of antlers as ever came from the head of a deer in this part. The animal that had carried them in July 1905 through the quaking aspen of the mountain was of the black tail species, and was killed on the upper Gallinas, some six miles from Beulah. The antlers have sixteen prongs, and measure two feet across the tips. The gentlemen report deer and grouse very plentiful this season.
