The Citizen learns that on November 1, at Socorro, Miss Ruth Perry will be united in marriage to John E. Griffith, a well known attorney of that town.

George C. Bowman, the real estate man, who yesterday became a benedict, was passing the cigars around today and receiving the congratulations of his friends.

S. O. Fletcher, of Santa Fe, an extensive tile contractor, who is operating a saw mill in the Manzano mountains, was in the city today transacting business and left for the mountains this afternoon.

Mrs. M. R. Reed, wife of Engineer Reed, of Las Vegas, is spending the day in the city. Mr. Reed is engaged in Eastern Star work and arrived from El Paso this morning and will go to Winslow tonight.

W. S. French, an extensive sheep raiser of Monte Vista, Colo., is spending a few days in Albuquerque transacting business with local commission men, and is arranging for the purchase of a large number of sheep.

Ernestine Luley, known as the Arizona marvelous magnet and the piano wonder of the world, will soon be in Albuquerque to give an entertainment. She plays 335 pieces of music from memory, and was formerly the cathedral organist to King Kalakana, Honolulu.

J. H. Coffin, assistant secretary of the American Lumber company, who has been confined to his home for a number of weeks suffering from a severe attack of typhoid fever, is able to be at his desk again in the offices at the mills.

The ladies of the Albuquerque Indian school have formed a club among themselves, which will be known as the Swastika club, named after the familiar Navajo emblem. The second meeting of the club will be held Friday afternoon at the home of Mrs. Oliver, wife of the assistant superintendent of the school.

Fred Raymer, who played second base for the Boston Nationals during the past season and made a great record for himself, is still in the city, but expects to leave Saturday or Sunday for southern California, where he will probably play ball during the winter months. Raymer is an Albuquerque boy, and since breaking into the big base ball league a few years ago has made for himself a good record.

The pastor of the Congregational church intends to have his edifice equipped with the best and most modern appliances possible, and his estimate places the probable cost at about \$3,000. At a recent meeting of the church directors, Messrs. Wm. Farr and E. L. Washburn were chosen a committee of two to secure the funds necessary, and it is learned this afternoon that they are meeting with great success.

TRUJILLO LET OFF WITH HEAVY FINE

SENTENCE OF ONE YEAR IN PENITENTIARY SUSPENDED DURING GOOD BEHAVIOR.

Bartolo Trujillo, who was convicted at the recent term of the district court for stealing sheep, has been sentenced by the court. Trujillo must pay a fine of \$500 at once, while a sentence of one year in the penitentiary is suspended during the good behavior of the prisoner.

The court was lenient with Trujillo because the jury in its finding recommended judicial clemency in his case. It is expected that the sentence of one year will have good effect on Trujillo, who has in days gone by been in more or less trouble.
