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ORDINANCE NO. 330.

An ordinance granting to E. M. Farrell, his successors and assigns, a privilege to number the houses of the City of Albuquerque, New Mexico:

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Albuquerque, New Mexico:

Section 1. The right to number all the houses of the City of Albuquerque, fronting on the public streets, avenues and thoroughfares within the City of Albuquerque, shall be and is hereby granted to E. M. Farrell, his successors and assigns, for the period of five years, from and after the approval thereof, for the purpose of numbering and maintaining numbers upon all the houses in the City of Albuquerque, and upon any houses that may hereafter be erected.

Sec. 2. And the privileges granted herein are upon the express condition that the work of numbering the houses shall begin within thirty days from the passage of this ordinance, and continue until the houses in the city are numbered, and provided also, that the numbering of all houses shall be done as prescribed in Chapter XLII, Compiled Ordinances of the City of Albuquerque of 1905.

Sec. 3. It is understood that the granting of this franchise shall in no way conflict with the rights of property owners, who may think proper, to number their own houses, so long as they do not conflict with the plans and regulations laid down in ordinances now in force in the City of Albuquerque.

Sec. 4. The said E. M. Farrell, his successors and assigns, shall furnish to the City of Albuquerque, free of charge, good and substantial street signs, to be put up and maintained upon at least one corner of each crossing of all streets and avenues, said signs to be placed as the Street Committee may direct.

Sec. 5. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication, and the grantee shall pay the cost of said publication.

ORDINANCE NO. 331.

Notice Ordinance to build of cement sidewalks on the east side of South Fourth street from Railroad avenue to Gold avenue, on the South side of Railroad avenue between Fifth and Sixth streets, on the west side of South Third street from Silver avenue to Atlantic avenue, on the south side of Tijeras avenue between First and Second streets, on the south side of South Arno street, between Gold avenue and Lead avenue, and on the east side of South Fourth street from Railroad avenue to Gold avenue.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Albuquerque, New Mexico: That the building of cement sidewalks, ten feet in width on the east side of South Fourth street from Railroad avenue to Gold avenue, and six feet in width on the south side of Railroad avenue between Fifth and Sixth streets, on the west side of South Third street from Silver avenue to Atlantic avenue, on the south side of Tijeras avenue between First and Second streets, on the south side of South Arno street between Gold avenue and Lead avenue, is necessary, the property abutting on said sidewalks, and the owners thereof, being as follows:

On the east side of South Fourth street from Railroad avenue to Gold avenue: Lot 12, block 17, original town site, Andrew W. Cleland.

On the south side of Railroad avenue, between Fifth and Sixth streets: Lot 7, block 19, original town site, Rosenwald Bros.

Lot 8, block 19, original town site, E. Maharam.

Lot 9, block 19, original town site, Unknown.

Lot 10, block 19, original town site, F. H. Kent.

On the west side of South Third street, from Silver avenue to Atlantic avenue: Lot 1, block 31, original town site, Mrs. A. J. Maloy.

Lot 1, block 31, original town site, Trustees M. E. Church.

Lot 13, (From Jay A. Hubbs' south), Ada E. Shupe.

Lot 13, block 1, Atlantic & Pacific addition, Sophie Medler.

Lot 13, block 1, Atlantic & Pacific addition, (north 50 feet), Policarpo Armijo.

Lot 13, block 1, Atlantic & Pacific addition, (south fifty feet), N. Metz.

On the south side of Tijeras avenue, between First and Second streets: Block "A", A. & P. addition, Blanchard and Mead and Shupe company.

On the south side of Tijeras avenue, between Sixth and Seventh streets: Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5, Fritz Greening addition, C. M. Capilupi.

On the east side of South Arno

street, between Gold avenue and Lead avenue: Lot 10, block 15, Huning Highland addition, J. H. Heald.

Lots 11 and 12, block 15, Huning Highland addition, O. A. Pearce.

Lots 7 and 8, block 15, Huning Highland addition, Mrs. A. J. Maloy.

Lot 7, block 16, Huning Highland addition, Dr. A. Pearce.

Lot 8, (north 10 feet), block 16, Huning Highland addition, O. A. Pearce.

Section 1. That the above described sidewalks be and are hereby ordered to be built of cement, of six feet in width, and in accordance with the grade to be furnished by the city engineer, to be begun and completed within twenty days after legal publication hereof, and service of a copy hereof on the owners of the property abutting thereon.

Sec. 2. That the city marshal be and hereby is ordered to notify the owners of the said abutting property, or if they be non-residents of the city of Albuquerque, the agent or person in charge of said property, by delivering a copy of this ordinance to him or such agent in charge, then by posting a copy thereof in a conspicuous place on said property within ten days from the publication hereof and make due return thereof to the city clerk, with the manner of service thereon endorsed on a copy hereof. And that the said owners thereof shall be thereupon notified and ordered to build said sidewalks the full length of their respective abutting property of the materials and dimensions and within the time above specified, and if he shall fail thereof, the city will, by authority in it vested by legislative act of the territory of New Mexico, entitled "An Act to Authorize the Building and Repair of Sidewalks in Cities, Towns and Villages," proceed to build said sidewalk, and tax the cost of construction thereof against the property adjoining thereto and the owners of the same.

Sec. 3. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

ORDINANCE NO. 326.

An Ordinance creating the office of City Scavenger:

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Albuquerque, New Mexico:

Section 1. The Mayor, by and with the advice and consent of the City Council, shall appoint a City Scavenger, who shall hold office until the expiration of the present administration, and in the future he shall hold office the same as other City officers; Provided, however, that the City Council may at any time remove said City Scavenger for failure to comply with the City Ordinance.

Sec. 2. All scavenger work shall be subject to the direction and control of the Board of Health. It shall be the particular duty of the Board of Health to enforce the provisions of this chapter in reference to garbage and scavenger work.

Sec. 3. The Board of Health shall designate, and the Mayor shall then buy, some suitable place for a city dumping ground, at which place all garbage, rubbish, offal, manure, dead animals and other offensive and unwholesome matter shall be taken and deposited; and it shall be the duty of the City Scavenger, at least once each week, and as much oftener as may be necessary, to cause to be burned or destroyed all garbage and rubbish deposited thereon.

And no person shall deposit, or cause to be deposited, any garbage, rubbish, manure, dead animals or other offensive or unwholesome matter at any place other than that designated as the city dumping ground.

Sec. 4. There shall be, and there are hereby established within the limits of the City of Albuquerque, two garbage districts, to be known and designated as Garbage District No. 1 and Garbage District No. 2.

Garbage District No. 1 shall comprise all that portion of Albuquerque which lies north of Railroad avenue, and Garbage District No. 2 shall comprise all that portion of Albuquerque which lies south of Railroad avenue.

Sec. 5. Within the garbage districts described in this Ordinance there shall be provided and kept by the owner, agent or occupant of any and every building a suitable covered metallic vessel, free from leakage, in which shall be placed all garbage and liquid refuse that accumulates in said building or on the premises.

Said receptacle shall be emptied not less than once during each week, in Spring, summer and fall, but not less than once in two weeks in winter, and in each case oftener if so desired by the Board of Health.

Sec. 6. It shall be unlawful for any person within the garbage districts described in Section 3 to deposit ashes and refuse in the same vessel, or receptacle with garbage or liquid refuse, so as not to create a nuisance, or endanger the public health, all persons residing within the garbage districts described in Section 3 of this ordinance shall place the metallic vessel containing such garbage or refuse immediately inside of the place, or fence, or other convenient place, where it can be reached by the drivers of scavenger carts with the least possible delay.

Sec. 7. It shall be unlawful to throw or cause to be thrown or deposited any ashes upon any street or private premises, except the same be confined in a safe and suitable ash can, said ash can to be so placed as to be easily accessible to the scavenger, and shall cause the contents of such ash can to be removed as often as necessary. And no person shall permit any ashes to remain on his or her premises or on any street or alley contiguous thereto, except the same be confined in an ash can.

Sec. 8. It shall be unlawful for any person to move garbage or liquid refuse night soil, ashes and other refuse and offal to a place designated as the city dumping ground, or to use a cart, vehicle or vessel for carrying any nauseous or offensive substances which shall not be strong, tight and covered, so as to be impenetrable, and of which the sides shall be made so high above the load, or contents, that no part of such contents shall fall, leak or spill therefrom. Nor shall any person or persons move the contents of any privy, vault, cess pool, or to transport the same through any of the streets of Albuquerque, except by means of an airtight vessel or in such manner as shall prevent entirely the escape of any noxious or offensive

odors therefrom, nor shall any person move the carcass of any dead animal except it be covered from view during removal.

Sec. 9. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to throw or deposit upon any street, alley or private premises within the city, any paper, straw, old clothing, shoes, bottles, dishes, glass ware, or other litter, nor to sweep the same upon any street or alley or other place. Nor shall any one engaged in hauling garbage or rubbish of decaying matter of any kind, be permitted to or cause any of the said matter to fall and remain in the streets.

Sec. 10. The City Scavenger shall provide suitable wagons, tools, and other appliances necessary for the performance of his duties as herein prescribed. And no person, not regularly appointed for the purpose, shall engage in the business of hauling garbage, liquid refuse, manure, or any other substance. Provided, that this condition does not apply to persons hauling their own garbage with their own teams.

Sec. 11. The City Scavenger may contract for the removal of garbage, manure and other substances from private premises to the city dumping ground; but in the absence of a contract, the City Scavenger shall not be permitted to charge in excess of twenty-five cents for the removal of a barrel, garbage or ash can, nor more than one dollar per wagon load for the removal and destruction of any substance whatever. For the removal and destruction of dead animals the Scavenger may charge not to exceed five dollars for a horse, cow, mule or burro, and not to exceed fifty cents for the removal and destruction of smaller animals. And in removing the contents of cess pools and privy vaults no scavenger shall charge to exceed two dollars per barrel or to exceed ten dollars per load.

Sec. 12. Any person, firm or corporation who violates or fails to comply with any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and, on conviction thereof, shall be fined not less than ten dollars nor more than fifty dollars.
